

Ten Senior 4-H Clubbers Chosen As State's Best

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 5 (UP) — Six boys and four girls today were named outstanding senior 4-H club members in Oregon for 1944 and will receive cash prizes from the Oregon State Bankers association.

H. C. Seymour, Oregon 4-H club leader, said the winners were judged on the basis of their club records for the past year. All are 19 years of age or older and members of the senior group, which does not compete with younger groups in state projects.

First place for the boys went to Ralph Cope of Langlois while Marjorie Wright of Days creek won first place for the girls. Other boy winners are: Martin Bradshaw, Brownsboro, second; Gerald Bauer, Neskowin, third; Bob Hueck, fourth; Bill Williams, Ashland, fifth; and Jay Hooten, Roseburg, sixth. Hueck, recently killed in action in Germany, went into the army last fall.

Other girl winners are: Arlys Harris, Summer Lake, second; Betty Lou Weisman, Roseburg, third; and Doris Church, Roseburg, fourth.

Officers Jailed For Taking Bribes

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 5 (UP) — Sheriff Robert E. Brady today promised full prosecution of any members of his staff caught grafting after three of his deputies were discharged following conviction of accepting bribes.

Deputies William Carter, Gene O. Johnson and Harry Titter confessed accepting \$100 from William Orr, negro, proprietor of a rural road cab, as payment for refraining from making gambling arrests. Orr was fined \$50 in justice court, given a 15 day suspended jail sentence and ordered to leave Vancouver. Carter was fined \$75 and costs and Johnson and Ritter each were sentenced to 30 days in jail, with 10 days suspended. The officers were policing housing areas.

March Aircraft Output is 2,544

WASHINGTON, April 5 (UP) — March aircraft production totaled 7,953 planes and included 2,544 bombers. War Production Chief J. A. Krug reported. This topped the month's goal by 190 planes. Aircraft rolled off assembly lines at the rate of 261 a day.

Water Plentiful In Irrigated Area

VALE, Ore., April 5 (UP) — Abundant irrigation water prospects prevail in Malheur county, Oregon's leading irrigated area, it was disclosed at the annual forecast meeting.

Soil moisture is good, both on crop and range land, delaying the need for irrigation beyond last year's date. The big Owyhee reservoir has more than 600,000 acre feet in storage now and will fill, assuring two year supply for lands it serves.



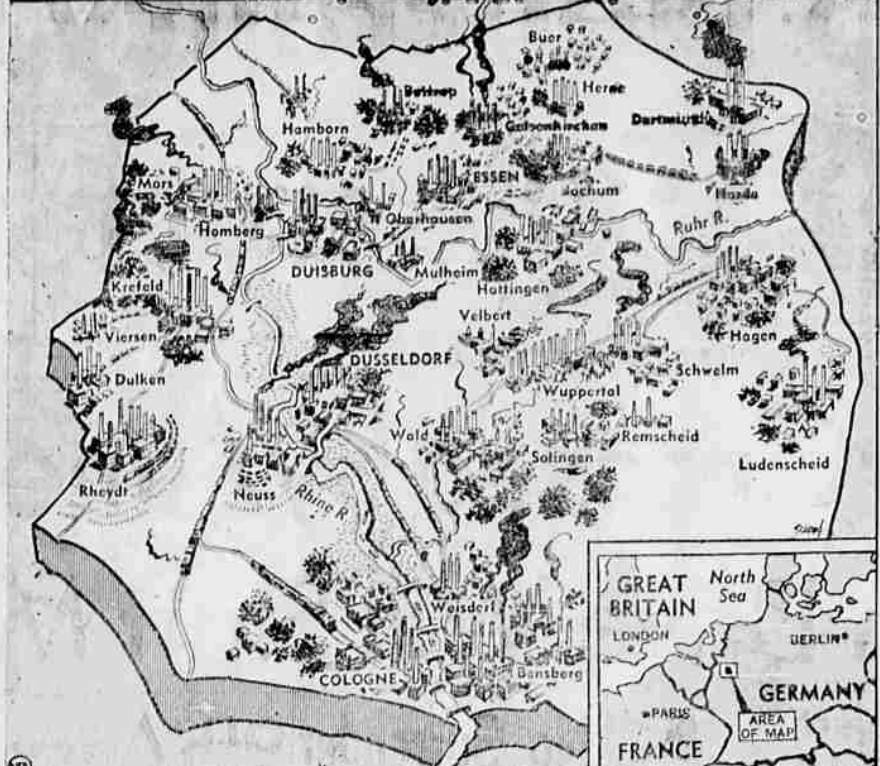

THE RUHR—Heart of German War Industry



The map above shows Germany's Ruhr valley area—some 6100 square miles wherein is concentrated what has been called the world's most powerful center of industrial activity. In effect, it is a gigantic coal pile which stokes German industries, from it they get well over 100,000,000 tons of hard coal a year and Ruhr coke smelts three-quarters of the Reich's iron and steel output. Over its flat landscape, grimy with work-dust, hangs a pall of smoke from the thousands of factory chimneys that needs up from the close-packed towns. Once the cors of German strength, some observers now see the Ruhr as Germany's Achilles' heel—an all-vital spot whose destruction or capture by the allies would so wreck war production that Hitler's armies simply could not carry on.

Farmers To Study Post-war Plans

WALLA WALLA, Wash., April 5 (UP) — A joint committee of northwest farm leaders will be formed to study post-war proposals affecting wheat.

A group of 35 farm organization leaders from Idaho, Washington and Oregon approved formation of the committee after going on record as favoring continuation of the AAA program after the war in regard to wheat, with more self-financing.

The meeting also suggested that the present parity formula be modernized, with not less than parity prices to be paid producers of wheat for that portion of their production used for human food within the United States.

Film Studios Cancel Strikers' Contracts

HOLLYWOOD, April 5 (UP) — The Motion Picture association producers today announced termination of collective bargaining contracts now in force between nine studios and the striking conference of studio unions.

The action followed notification of 10,000 striking employees yesterday that they were fired for refusing to end the 25-day, AFL jurisdictional strike of craftsmen in the film industry.

Union affected are the painters, interior decorators, machinists, electricians, and set decorators unions, all out on strike. Cut flowers will more quickly if placed near apples, due to a gas given off by the fruit.

German Prisoners Die In U. S. Train

PARIS, April 5 (UP) — Supreme headquarters announced today that a number of German war prisoners were suffocated in a course of rail movement to camps in France on March 15-16 while in the custody of American troops.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower ordered an investigation and notified the German government through intermediate diplomatic channels. An interim report, SHEAF said, indicated that the prisoners died because of insufficient ventilation in a new type of American box car. Details were lacking.

Few Japs Return To Oregon After Ban Is Lifted

PORTLAND, April 5 (UP) — The war relocation authority today disclosed that approximately 367 of the 18,565 alien and American-born Japanese excluded from Oregon and Washington in 1942 have returned since army orders were relaxed in January.

Records show that 167 of Oregon's 4,900 Japanese are back and about 200 of Washington's 14,565 total.

C. W. Linville, Oregon WRA relocation officer, said the figures show 73 relocated in Portland, 30 in Clackamas county, 28 in Multnomah county outside Portland, 29 in Hood River county, seven in Washington county, four each in Marion and Wasco counties, and one in Clatsop county.

Portland had a Japanese population of 1,680 in 1940, of whom 723 were aliens. A 1942 count showed approximately 750 Japanese in a eastern Multnomah county. Malheur county, which is outside the exclusion area, had 137 Japanese in 1940.

Pre-war figures for other counties are as follows, with the first figure representing the total of Japanese, the second the number of foreign born Japanese: Baker, 46, 25; Clatsop 98, 54; Columbia 38, 18; Deschutes 14, 6; Grant 10, 5; Jackson 41, 20; Hood River 462, 162; Jefferson 12, 2; Lake 11, 5; Lane 1 and 1; Lincoln 4, 2; Linn 4, 2; Marion 193, 49; Morrow 3, 2; Multnomah 2390, 968; Polk 28, 15; Sherman 3, 2; Umatilla 10, 5; Union 10, 1; Wasco 82, 34; Washington 245, 105; Yamhill 65, 24.
