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Austrian Capital Is Scene of Bitter Street Fighting

ing, site of Vienna's main gas, power and water stations after capturing adjoining Scheuchat on the edge of the city yesterday.

Suburbs Captured
Marshal Feodor I. Tolbukhin's third Ukrainian army group captured Scheuchat and presumably was the first to enter Vienna itself. Altkettenhof and Rothneuseid, both four miles west of Vienna, also fell to the third army group as it clamped a pincers around the city.

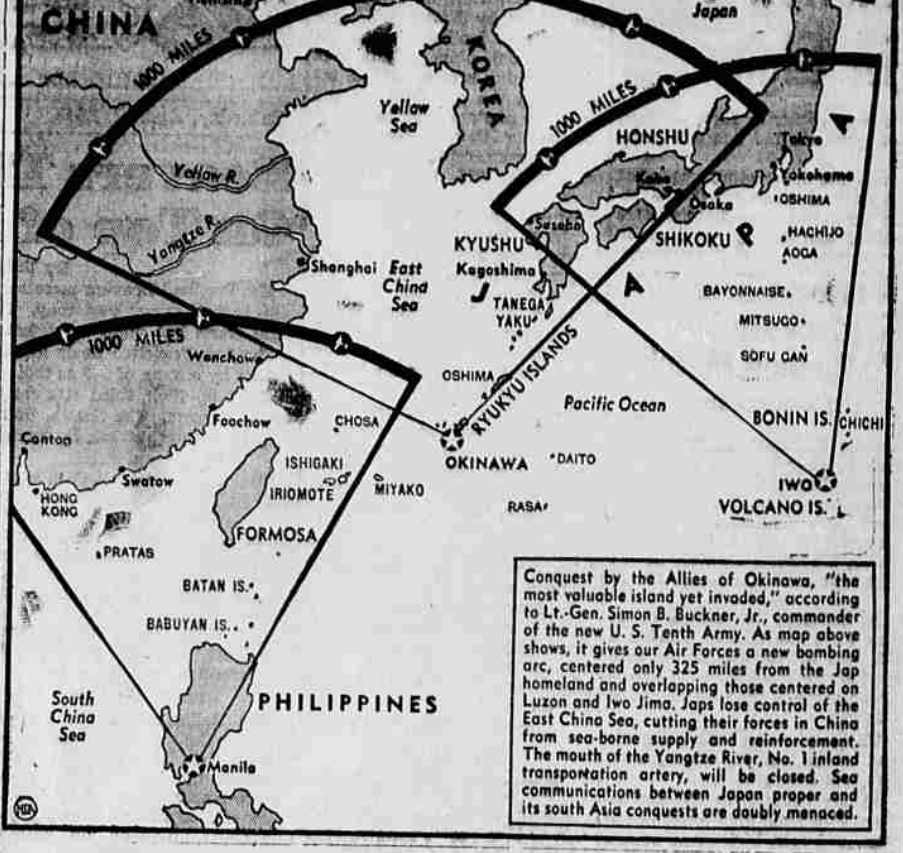
The second Ukrainian army group under Marshal Rodion Y. Malinovsky cleared a 17-mile stretch of the south bank of the Danube river and joined in the assault from the southeast.

Malinovsky's troops reached the southeastern outskirts after capturing the twin suburbs of Fischamendorf and Fischamendmarkt, five miles west of Scheuchat.

Other second army group units threatened Vienna from the northeast. They broke through to the Morava river on a 37-mile front north of its confluence with the Danube and opposite the Napoleonic battlefields of Wagram and Aspern-Essling.

brought it under attack at midday.

Helldivers, Avengers, Hellcats and Corsairs rose in great swarms from the carrier decks and roared in to the attack. They found no air opposition over the fleet, but met heavy anti-aircraft fire.

Helldivers tipped over in screaming, near-vertical bombing dives on the Yamato. Avengers roared in low over the waters to launch their torpedoes against the dreadnaught.

When the attack was completed, the Yamato was sinking—racked by at least eight torpedo hits and eight heavy bomb explosions.

Other bombs and torpedoes ripped into other ships of the enemy task force. Fighters raked the Japanese warships with rockets and strafing fire.

The two cruisers and three destroyers were left burning in the water.

Hannover, Bremen Isolated As Lines To South Are Cut

First army troops cut deeper into the wily German pocket of the Ruhr, driving across the Sieg river and capturing Siegen on the southern boundary of the Ruhr.

First army headquarters reported that the trapped troops, possibly as many as 150,000, were the German fifth panzer and 15th armies under command of Field Marshal Walter von Model who was believed to be still inside the pocket. First army officers said there was no hope that the Germans might break out.

The U. S. Third army which lost the little town of Struth, five miles west of Muehlhausen in a Nazi counterattack, recaptured the town a few hours later.

While Patton's far-flung tank columns slowed down momentarily to regroup and bring up fresh supplies for the drive on Berlin, two strong bands of Nazi elite guards broke loose on a wild gun spree far behind his advanced spearheads.

A force of at least 400 German riflemen, backed up by four tanks, struck suddenly at American infantrymen in Struth, five miles west of captured Muehlhausen.

The Germans attacked in the pre-dawn darkness this morning and drove the American garrison out of the town after a short, bitter street fight.

The surprise attack followed by a few hours a similar counter-attack against American-held Bad Soden, 14 miles west of Struth and 19 miles east of Kassel. The fight was still raging furiously around Bad Soden early today, but the Americans apparently were more firmly established there and appeared to be holding fast.

"What did you say?" an MP barked.

The woman repeated her statement and the MPs immediately investigated and found the trove.

Southern Luzon Cleanup Sparked By Airborne Force

MANILA, April 7 (UP)—Airborne troops, who hopped 20 miles to seize the provincial capital of Lucena, sparked an American drive that was rapidly clearing the entire southern half of Luzon today.

Elements of the 11th airborne division landed at Lucena, capital of Tayabas province, in small liaison planes (Wednesday) and quickly seized the city and its two airstrips, two miles inland from Tayabas bay.

The airborne units were packing the American drive down the southeastern part of Luzon toward a junction with other U. S. troops which already had cleared Sorsogon province at the end of the island's long tail.

Seizure of Lucena's airfield provided another base for aerial forces which are maintaining a firm blockade of Japanese shipping through the China seas.

Ground units of the 11th airborne division were pushing eastward from Tiaong against light resistance and were less than 13 miles from the troops which hopped to Lucena.

training of CAP cadets, who range in age from 15 to 18 years, and that they in turn are potential leaders in aviation and CAP.

The basic courses are offered both boys and girls.

Since December, 1941, the state aeronautical board has sponsored the CAP program, furnishing financial assistance, and the civil air patrol in return fulfills several duties of the state board, in that it provides aviation education, and through joint interest adds impetus to airport development programs and the flying service of the new airports being developed. More airstrips are scheduled to be developed as they are surveyed by the state board, he said.

After his eastern Oregon trip, Col. Devaney, a veteran flyer of World War I, will go to a regional CAP conference in Santa Ana to discuss further CAP developments.

Tin Can Salvage To Be Resumed Here April 25

following the initial collection, the monthly pick-up service will be provided by the three garbage services serving the city which have volunteered the use of trucks and drivers to make the monthly collections at their own expense, and two helpers will be provided through the salvage committee.

Wayne Schuster, Lynn Williams and Charles Peck are the operators of the services who are cooperating in the effort to salvage as many cans as possible in the city.

Once the cans are cleaned and prepared for the collectors, they should be placed in bags or cartons to facilitate handling, as it is necessary to handle them at least three times before they are finally placed in a car ready to go to the detinning plant.

Three Counties Cooperate
In order to expedite shipment and provide carload lots at more frequent intervals, the salvage committees of Union, Baker and Umatilla counties will join in filling the cars. A car will be started on its way at Baker, receive additional cans in La Grande, and will then go to Pendleton for the final portion of its load.

Salvage officials point out that Malaya and the Dutch East Indies, chief sources of tin, are still in the hands of the Japanese, and that until they are again in allied hands there can be no appreciable increase in the available supplies of crude tin. They say there is no possibility of increasing supplies from other sources, making it imperative that every ounce of tin be salvaged from cans.

This goes into many types of war ordnance, and in addition it is used in containers for food and drugs for men at the front, for making instruments that ease the pain of the wounded, and for many other purposes for which science has not yet found satisfactory substitutes.

Suicide Attempt Of Murderer Fails

SAN FRANCISCO, April 7 (UP)—Louis L. Jackson, convicted Negro slayer of a woman bus driver, broke away from police today while being taken to San Quentin prison's death row but was recaptured after he had slashed his neck and wrists with a razor.

Jackson reportedly did not injure himself seriously. Jackson shot to death Miss Winifred Cecil, navy bus driver, last January.

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Nazis Are Recaptured

MEDFORD, Ore., April 7 (UP)—Camp White officials said today Hermann Dier, 21, and Hermann Goebel, 25, German prisoners who escaped March 26, will be returned to the stockade. Guards
