Markets

Stocks Irregular On Inactive Market

NEW YORK, April 9 (UP) - Stocks moved irregularly in a narrow range today with trading light.

Anticipating an early end of the German side of the war some traders bought low-priced utilities. American Water Works led the whole market in volume. It made a new high and then eased to a small net loss. Electric Power also had a large turnover and equalled its high. United Corporation, well up in the active list, was unchanged.

Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad issues were features of the carrier group. The common stock rose to 3 1/4 up 1 1/2 points and the preferred to 28, up 2 1/4 points.

Steel shares receded fractionally. Rails outside of Katy issues also sagged with few exceptions. Motors, coppers and some of the aircrafts declined small amounts.

International Nickel preferred gained nearly three points to a new high. Gains of one to nearly two points were noted in Best and Co., food machinery, Interchemical Corp., Dow Chemical, Crown Work and Seal, Timken Detroit Axle and Wayne Pump.

Declines of a point or more were made by Corn Products preferred, Grumman, McIntyre Porcupine, and Superior Oil of California.

Hannover, Bremen Are Stormed By U.S. British Troops

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east of Suhl, where light counterattacks were beaten off. Detachments of the 26th division invaded the region eight miles southeast of Suhl, and Bedheim, 15 miles south of Suhl, was captured.

First Army Moves Up
Hodges' tanks and mobile infantry were chopping forward through a 25-mile gap in the German defenses on both sides of the Leine river, a tributary of the Weser, in the area northwest of Nordhausen.

Field dispatches said the first army forces struck 12 miles east from their last reported position at Goettingen to Duderstadt, 70 miles southwest of Magdeburg and 133 southwest of Berlin.

One column pushed 18 miles northeast from the Weser river to Orlheim, 73 miles from Magdeburg and 136 from Berlin. Another captured Einbeck, eight miles northwest of Nordheim where a German major-general came out to surrender the town. Heiligenstadt, 14 southwest of Goettingen, fell with only token resistance.

Airborne Strike Revealed
Berlin reported some 500 American skytroops dropped in to a 36-mile corridor between Muenchen on the Weser river and Muehlhausen, but there was no immediate confirmation.

It was the second airborne allied strike against the crumbling German positions in little more than 24 hours. British paratroops who showered down Sunday morning joined up with the Canadian first army and sealed off possibly 50,000 Germans along the V-bomb coast to the west.

Big Cities Afflame
Hannover and Bremen, were aflame and mysterious fires, apparently set by the fleeing Nazis, were reported leaping through Hamburg, Luckeburg and dozens of other towns and cities in the path of the invaders.

American ninth army troops fanned out southward from besieged Hannover toward Brunswick, and unconfirmed front reports said they were by-passing the latter city in a thrust for a giant German Goering tank plant 15 miles farther south.

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tion into a permanent, stable body which will be representative of eastern Oregon sportsmen.

Too many divergent ideas are presented to the game commission when sportsmen are unorganized, he said, making the situation chaotic.

He outlined effect of various game laws and the future planning policies of the commission. Bennington described the operation of a similar organization in southeastern Washington, declaring that sportsmen of that area have been organized into a council since 1923. Since that time projects and legislation have been promoted in that region to the benefit of sportsmen and game.

Twelve Areas Represented
Representatives from 12 communities and clubs were present at the session, spending nearly three hours in formulation of the organization. Elgin, Baker, Pendleton, Milton-Freewater, North Powder, Summerville, Alicel, Cove, Pilot Rock, Minam, Enterprise, Joseph, state forest offices, and federal forest offices were represented.

By-laws and a constitution were adopted, specifying that each community is entitled to one representative on the council, regardless of how many organizations are existent in the community and that each member sportsmen's group be assessed 10 cents for each member by the council.

The meeting was presided over by Green, and Lee Tuttle, publisher of the Elgin Recorder, acted as temporary secretary.

La Grande was represented by 20 sportsmen, headed by Ernest Walden, president of the Sportsmen's club, and A. J. Stange.

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life on the child. She emphasized the wife's responsibility in making that marriage a success. She stressed the importance of the church and school in proper rearing of a child, but said it is home environment that has the greatest effect.

She compared the rearing of a child 50 years ago with methods of today, saying at that time the average parent taught a child fear of consequences for a misdemeanor, in contrast to the present preferred method of determining why the child acts as it does, and then removing the cause, instead of condemning.

It was her opinion that children will accept conventions and restrictions without resentment if the situation is properly explained rather than demanded by the adult, that children show open resentment when a plan of behavior is presented in an unfair manner. Society exists for the family and not the family for society, she said, and explained how the necessary social conventions can be taught children without arousing antagonistic responses.

She advised taking the long view of the matter, considering the finished product, or the child as an adult, and the measures to be taken to produce that type of person, rather than expecting perfection in a child.

Vienna Capture Seems Imminent

give a pep talk to his troops. Dietrich, one of Hitler's favorite commanders, had been in command of the sixth panzer army in the Ardennes breakthrough last December before being shifted to Vienna.

Moscow also broadcast an official declaration asserting that Red army troops had entered Austria as liberators with no territorial ambitions or claims. Russia will cooperate in restoring Austria's pre-Anschluss independence, the declaration said.

Marshall Fielder Ballhugan is set to make a proclamation promising that Vienna's liberation was near, ending upon the popular joy, preventing the Germans from entering the city, blowing up bridges and looting.

He said the Nazi party in Austria would be disbanded and that its members will not be molested if they cooperated with the Red army.

Army Launches Swift, Versatile A-26 Invader for Bombing and Strafing



The Douglas A-26 Invader... fastest, fightingest, bomber-strafer.

FLORENCE, S. C. - What Hitler's Stukas did to the Poles, the French and the British in 1939 was gentle and loving in contrast with what our new A-26 "Invader" bomber-strafer will do to the Nazis, if they do not capitulate soon, and to the Japs in any event.

The Stuka, you may remember, was devastating against the allies at the outbreak of the war, when it could dive-bomb front line troops and installations virtually without opposition. It disappeared from the news because, once we got pursuit planes and anti-aircraft defenses into play, the Stuka was a clay pigeon for our gunners. It lacked the speed and maneuverability and versatility required for the job.

The A-26 was ordered by our AAF materiel command in 1940 to do what the Stukas and our own A-2
