3rd Army Crosses Czech Border in Drive to Prague

(Continued from Page 1) north of Asch, was taken in the advance.

Other third army forces advanced as much as 10 miles on either flank of the 90th division. The northern wing was cutting across German soil just above the Czechoslovak border and the southern flank was closing on the border from a point south of Hof.

Other American forces stormed the five key citadels of Hitler's collapsing reich in a general offensive that German spokesmen admitted had wiped out their western front.

Patton's northern wing stormed into Chemnitz, one of the five key citadels of the Czechoslovak border and 80-odd miles west of the oncoming Red army.

Magdeburg Taken

American ninth army troops finally captured the ruined city of Magdeburg, 60 miles southwest of Berlin, except for a small suburban district lying on the east bank of the Elbe.

The Nazi garrison, largely fanatical Hitler youths, quit after 24 hours of ferocious street fighting, but the first American troops to reach the Elbe found all four of the Magdeburg bridges had been blown up.

Filipinos Capture Collaborationists

MANILA, April 18 (UP)—U. S. troops today stormed the outskirts of Baguio, Japanese citadel from which Filipino guerrillas have rescued more than 7,000 civilians in the last three weeks.

The civilians, who were brought to the American lines, included a number of U. S. citizens, President Sergio Osmeña's daughter, Milagros, and Brig. Gen. Manuel Roxas, former speaker of the Philippines assembly.

Four members of the Filipino collaborationist government also were captured by the Igorot natives who stole into Baguio at night and brought out the civilians in groups ranging from two to 1800 persons.

Nazis Are Battered In Big Air Raids

LONDON, April 18 (UP)—More than 2,350 American and RAF bombers and fighters attacked rail targets and German air fields throughout the reich today continuing their reduction of the luftwaffe's waning air strength.

The eighth air force sent out 1,350 bombers and fighters to hit rail targets and air fields in southern Germany and western Czechoslovakia.

RAF targets were the Heligoland naval base and the airfield on the nearby island of Dune.

Stocks Continue Upward Movement

NEW YORK, April 18 (UP)—The stock market moved up strongly today after a faltering start and all sections of the list hit new high ground since mid-1937.

First hour selling was interpreted in Wall street as only a normal reaction of the six successive preceding sessions of sharply rising prices. When traders showed little disposition to follow the opening decline new buying developed and spread even into the "war baby" rail and motor groups.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 18 (UP)—Additional strength was noted today in the egg market, owing to increasing demand and decreasing supplies. Operators were combing the market for storage supplies.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, April 18 (UP)—Grain futures rallied to a partial recovery on the board of trade today on the close. May rye held independently firm throughout the session in a nervous market.

Stop-loss orders and short-covering and an upturn in Winnipeg rye aided the rally.

Rye finished the day up 3/4 to off 1 1/2 cents a bushel; wheat was off 1 cent to up 1/4; corn off 1/4 to up 1/8; oats off 1/4 to up 1/8, and barley unchanged to off 1/4.

The combination of favorable war news, excellent crop prospects and more cars to transport grain depressed wheat futures. Selling in May led the recession and demand for other deliveries lagged.

Corn futures reflected the freer spot market yesterday and liberal country selling of corn for deferred shipment.

Clothing Piles Up For People of Liberated Areas

Clothing that may save the lives of many destitute men, women and children of devastated Europe has been prepared for shipment at the La Grande depot of the United national clothing campaign, where to date women volunteers have sorted and packed 3,000 pounds of articles of various kinds contributed by residents of the city.

Members of the auxiliary of the local lodge of Eagles devoted yesterday to work at the receiving depot in the L. C. Smith building on Depot street, and next Tuesday the work will be taken up by the auxiliary to the veterans of foreign wars.

A. B. Olson and Lynn Larson, co-chairmen of the Union county campaign, announced they expect first contributions from other communities to arrive within the next week. Meanwhile, they urged that county residents make every effort to get their cast-off clothing and shoes in to the depot.

They emphasized that clothing must be clean and wearable, but it is not necessary that it be sent to the cleaner before being turned in.

"All that is necessary," they said, "is that it is clean and suitable for someone to wear, as we have neither cleaning nor mending facilities."

The local committee is in receipt of a bulletin from Henry J. Kaiser, famous shipbuilder, chairman of the national campaign, in which he comments on the deep personal interest the late President Roosevelt had in the campaign, and added "we must remember that it was always of the human being that he thought, and he would want us to think of human being now . . . and carry on this cherished project of his to a great finish."

Anti-Jap League Formation Upheld

SALEM, Ore., April 18 (UP)—Attorney General George Neuner had ruled today that the articles of incorporation of the "Japanese exclusion league" should be accepted by the state corporation commissioner.

The organization has its headquarters in Gresham.

He said that there is no unlawful purpose evident on the face of the articles.

The articles as filed are aimed at the prevention of the return of Japanese to the west coast during the war.

B-29s Batter Japs' 'Suicide' Air Bases

GUAM, April 18 (UP)—More than 100 superfortresses ripped Japan's six main suicide-plane bases in southern Kyushu before dawn today for the second time in less than 12 hours.

A Japanese broadcast said American troops have landed on tiny Menna island, just south of newly conquered Ie island and three miles off Okinawa's Motobu peninsula.
