Meat, Butter, Fat, Cheese:
Book 4—Red stamps T5 through X5 through April 28. Red stamps Y5 through D2 valid through June 2. Red stamps E2 through H2 valid through June 30. Red stamps I2 through P2 valid through July 31.

Sugar:
Book 4—Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2. New sugar stamp valid May 1.

Many Red Cross Parcels Going to Nazi Prison Camps

WASHINGTON, April 20 (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's headquarters has reported that large quantities of Red Cross supplies are being delivered to American and allied prisoners of war in German prison camps. Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said Gen. Eisenhower reported an average of 10 freight cars a day of Red Cross food parcels are being shipped to northern camps through the port of Lubeck. Other deliveries are being made by barges, Stimson said. From Switzerland 393 German freight car loads of food packages reached their destinations during March, while 108 freight cars left Switzerland last week. One freight car can carry 2,800 of the 11-pound Red Cross food parcels, each containing rations for a week. Stimson said the largest concentration of American prisoners is now at Stalag 7A at Moosburg, 25 miles northeast of Munich. At last reports there were 9,812 U. S. prisoners, including about 4,000 officers and some enlisted men who had been transferred from Stalagluft 3 at Nurnberg, there.

months later I weighed 120." He pointed to a German prisoner fixing a lawn-mower. "Is it true they get beer and cigarettes?" Capt. Eldon Stewart, Eugene, and Lieutenant Hunker were sitting in the back of the room talking. "There's a family of Poles back there I wish I could send some American books," the captain said. "The kids were trying to learn English so they could help prisoners like us." Aided by Poles "The Poles were wonderful," Hunker agreed. "A family took three of us in, after we'd been hiding in a haystack for three days. Our water was frozen in the canteens, and the Red Cross food we'd saved was frozen solid. The Polish family fed us meat and bread and milk and cake—the most wonderful meal I've ever had." "Our red letter day was Jan. 31, when we were liberated by the Russians," Cpl. John R. Taylor, Seattle, explained. "But there was a Russian woman—a tank commander. When she found out we were Americans, she threw her arms around one of the guys and kissed him." "She couldn't have been more than 20—and to us, she was the most beautiful woman we'd ever seen." Daily rations in the central German camp from which the ten enlisted men were liberated consisted of one cup of tea, (at least they called it tea, "one of them added.) A canteen of soup and one-sixth of a loaf of bread. Sleep on Floor None of the men had beds at the prison camp. They slept on the floor with two blankets. "Sometimes we'd just wrap up to try to keep warm and lie there all day without saying a thing," one of the men said. "Quite often we didn't have strength to report for roll call, and they'd come and get us." The letters their families had written didn't come through, a sergeant said. "It was all right, though," he added. "You can't cut letters."

Yanks, Senators Will Honor FDR

WASHINGTON, April 20 (UP)—The Washington Senators open their home season against the unbeaten New York Yankees at Griffith stadium today with a crowd of 30,000 expected to witness a game dedicated to the memory of the late President Roosevelt. The two teams were to have officially opened baseball's 1945 season on Monday but were rained out. Openers in other major league cities were played Tuesday.

Dedication ceremonies will get under way shortly before game time with Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson leading a parade to the flagpole in center field.

Last Rites are Set For Pioneer Doctor

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20 (UP)—Funeral services for Dr. Charles J. Smith, who died yesterday of a heart attack at the age of 81, will be held Monday in Portland. Dr. Smith, who was prominent for a number of years in Oregon medical and political life, was mayor of Pendleton for two years, served on the Pendleton school board for 18 years, in the state senate for eight years from Umatilla county, and was Democratic nominee for governor in 1914 but was defeated.

He helped organize the state board of health and was a member for many years. He became head of the board of health and chairman of the board of higher curricula and a member of the industrial welfare commission. COOPER TO CONTINUE
