

Violinist Will Appear Tonight In Final Event of Civic Music Season

Louis Kaufman, popular violinist of the motion pictures and concert stage, will appear in concert this evening in the high school to present the final program of the 1944-45 concert season of the Union county civic music association. The doors will open at 8 p. m., and the concert will start promptly at 8:30 o'clock.

Opening with the difficult and arresting Sonata in A major of Cesar Franck, the violinist also will play compositions of Mendelssohn, Saint-Saens, Tchaikovsky, and Paganini, and in addition to these representative violin pieces from the classics, he will delve into the works of contemporary composers for four sections that are typical of the music that is currently in wide public favor.

The "Ukelele Serenade" by Aaron Copland, a "litterbug" work by Robert Bennett, the violinist's arrangement of a "blues" number by William Grant Still, and a Brazilian samba by Harold Triggs are programmed.

Processed Foods:
Book 4 — Blue stamps C2 through G2 valid through April 23. Blue stamps H2 through M2 valid through June 2. Blue stamps N2 through S2 valid through June 30. Blue stamps T2 through X2 valid through July 31.

Meat, Butter, Fats, Cheese:
Book 4 — Red stamps T5 through X5 through April 23. Red stamps Y5 through D2 valid through June 2. Red stamps E2 through J2 valid through June 30. Red stamps K2 through P2 valid through July 31.

Sugar:
Book 4 — Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2. New sugar stamp valid May 1.

Shoes: Loose stamps invalid.
Book 3 — Airplane stamps 1-2-3 now valid.

Gasoline: Coupons not valid unless endorsed.
"A" 15 coupons expire June 21.

Stoves:
Apply local board for oil, gas stove certificates.

Wood, Coal, Sawdust:
Delivery by priorities based on needs.

Period 1-2-3-4-5 coupons valid through August 31. Now more in 55 per cent of season. Coupons should have been used by 6/1.

Liquid Fertilizer Aid to Gardeners Here Are Pointers for Transplanting

Use of a "starter" solution in transplanting tomato, cabbage, pepper and other plants in one's victory garden is recommended by County Agent R. W. Schaad in a bulletin in which he provides a number of other timely suggestions for home gardeners.

This "starter" is just liquid fertilizer, made by mixing one tablespoonful of victory garden fertilizer sulphate of ammonia, nitrate of soda or ammoniated phosphate in a gallon of water.

He cautions against using more than one tablespoonful to a gallon of water since plants may be injured or killed by a stronger mixture. About a pint of the liquid fertilizer poured about each plant when it is set out in the garden is recommended. The treatments may be repeated in 10 days with good results.

Points to observe in transplanting are listed by Schaad as suggestions for giving the plants a chance to start off quickly and make rapid growth followed:

Disturb roots as little as possible and keep all roots attached. Never pull or tear the plants loose.

Water the plants a few hours before removing them for transplanting.

Do not allow plants to dry out after removal.

Transplant in cool, cloudy weather or in the afternoon if possible.

Set each plant slightly deeper than before in a hole large
