10 Are Chosen For Baseball's Hall of Fame

NEW YORK, April 26 (UP)—The doors of baseball's hall of fame at Cooperstown, N. Y., opened wide today for 10 great old timers whose feats on the diamond occurred before 1910.

Their plaques will be placed with baseball's immortals along with the late high commissioner of baseball, Judge Kenesaw M. Landis.

Jimmy Collins, former Boston Red Sox third baseman, and Roger Bresnahan, New York Giant catcher who died recently, were on the list of candidates of the baseball writers' association, but both failed to receive the necessary 75 per cent majority.

The Hollywood Stars still were entrenched in the Pacific coast league cellar today but they had more reason to be cheerful than at any time since the pennant campaign began.

Pitcher Joe Mishasek cut the gloom in the Twinks' camp when he pitched them to a 3-0 victory over the second-place Seattle Rainiers in the first game of a doubleheader last night. Seattle copped the nightcap, 2-1, but had to bear down all the way as Hollywood continued to provide stiff opposition.

Mishasek allowed the Rainiers only three scattered hits while his teammates collected six off Alex Palica, young Seattle moundsman, who suffered his first loss of the season. Carl Fischer was the winning twirler in the finale, giving up nine hits but tightening up in the clutches. Three hits and a walk gave the Rainiers their runs in the sixth.

The Portland Beavers maintained a one-game hold on first place even though they lost to Oakland, 4 to 2. The Acorns staked Red Mann to a three-run margin in the first inning and were never headed.

Chandler Promises "Clean" Baseball Senators Honor New Diamond Czar

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—Baseball's new high commissioner, Sen. Albert B. (Happy) Chandler, made it plain today that one of his first official acts will be to restore the major league all-star game in July if the war in Europe ends soon.

The Kentucky Democrat, moved almost to tears by the high tribute of his senate colleagues, was given a big send-off yesterday in the closing moments of the day's session in the chamber.

It was started by 79-year-old Sen. Hiram Johnson, R., Cal., who crossed over to the Democratic side and described Chandler as a "man of undisputed guts."

Shaking his finger at the 46-

year-old Kentuckian Johnson admonished him to "be yourself—baseball is peculiarly representative of this country. See that it represents you."

Chandler arose in response and said:
"As long as I live I'll never forget those words of approval from one of the greatest men America ever produced. I promise you, Senator Johnson, that I will keep baseball clean."

Chandler said he has asked Leslie O'Connor, secretary to his predecessor, the late Judge K. M. Landis, to remain at his post at least for awhile. He will confer at Chicago with O'Connor next week and may decide to transfer the commissioner's offices elsewhere.

Poultry Markets To Close to Curb Prices

LOS ANGELES, April 26 (UP)—Southern California poultry markets will close Friday for an indefinite period, Julius L. Sampson, attorney for the Poultry Dealers association of Southern California, said today.

In a heated meeting which lasted until early this morning, 150 dealers voted to close shops as the only way to force poultry producers' prices down to OPA wholesale ceiling prices, Sampson said.

"Right now dealers have been paying 40 cents a pound, 11 cents above the ceiling. That means a loss for the dealers," the attorney explained.

City, County Get Beverage Funds

Allocation of \$304.44 to Union county and \$385.32 to the city of La Grande from the first quarterly apportionment of beverage taxes was announced today in Salem by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, jr. The quarterly disbursement totalled \$54,198.

The money is distributed on a population basis, and it was announced that cities of less than 2,000 population may make application to the secretary of state for a census to determine their share in the apportionment, under an arrangement approved at the recent session of the legislature.

U. S. Casualties Reach 927,373

WASHINGTON, April 26 (UP)—U. S. combat casualties reached 927,373 today in official compilations here.

Today's total is 17,173 greater than that for a week ago. Navy, coast guard and marine corps casualties, meanwhile, passed the 100,000 mark, reaching 100,372. The army total is 829,001.
