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Red Sox Rookie Beats Athletics In First Time Out

NEW YORK, April 30 (UP)—Pitcher Dave Ferriss, late of the army air forces, was full of strawberry ice cream today and the Boston Red Sox were full of hope.

They had a joint celebration, he and his new team mates, yesterday in a fitting climax to a major league diamond drama that has had few parallels.

Three months ago Ferriss was an unsung cogwheel at Randolph field, Tex. Today he is the toast of the majors because he pitched a five-hit shutout in his very first big time appearance. In addition, he had a perfect day at bat with three singles in Boston's 2 to 0 victory in the opener of a double bill at Philadelphia.

Then the Red Sox, who had lost eight games in a row, went out to take the second game, too, in 13 innings, 6 to 3, for their third straight victory. That called for the ice cream binge in the dressing room with Ferriss the host.

Good pitching was the order of the day elsewhere yesterday, three other shutouts being turned in. At Cleveland, Paul (Dizzy) Trout won his third game and second shutout for Detroit, beating the Indians, 4 to 0, after Steve Gromak had blanked the Tigers, also by a 4 to 0 score.

Browns Win Pair

The St. Louis Browns, who appeared to be returning to the obscurity which preceded their 1944 pennant drive, won two games from the visiting Chicago White Sox, 3 to 2, and 10 to 4.

The Yankees and Senators split at New York, Hank Borowy getting his third victory in the opener, 13 to 4. Washington took the second, 2 to 1, on four-hit pitching by Roger Wolff.

In the National league, the Cardinals beat pitcher Bucky Walters of Cincinnati for the first time since 1943, 8 to 3, to sweep a double header after winning the opener, 2 to 1.

Pittsburgh snapped the Cubs' six-game winning streak with a twin win at Chicago, 6 to 2, and 5 to 4.

At Boston, the Braves and Phillies divided their games, Philadelphia taking the opener, 5 to 3, with a late rally against Jim Tobin and the Braves the second, 1 to 0, on Alva Javary's seven-hit pitching and timely hitting.

Dixie Walker's three run homer gave the Dodgers a 4 to 3 victory over the Giants at Brooklyn in a single game. Hal Gregg gaining his second win.

In third place was Mrs. J. B. Burnstein's Okana, making his first start since running third in the \$75,000 Hollywood Park Gold Cup last December. Okana was in front coming into the stretch, but tired and barely held show from G. W. Lawless' Vain Grove.

The winner ran the mile and one-sixteenth in 1:42 4-5.

Oregon State to Revive Football

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 30 (UP)—Percy Loyce, athletic director, announced today that Oregon State college will resume intercollegiate athletics next fall — including football, it was decided today at a meeting of the Oregon state intercollegiate athletic board.

With Oregon State taking a stand on conference play, the list of northern division schools which now have tentative plans to play includes Idaho, Washington State and the University of Washington. The University of Oregon is the only school which has made no decision.

Twelve thousand fans at Los Angeles saw five homers drop over the fence at Wrigley field, including a swat by Catcher Norm Schleuter which won the second game for the Solons. Pitcher Red Adams hit a round-tripper for the Angels in the opener, a feat which was duplicated by his teammate, Jack Calvey, who got another in the nightcap.

This week, San Francisco visits Sacramento; Seattle is entertained by Oakland; Portland goes to Hollywood as Los Angeles travels to San Diego.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 30 (UP)—San Antonio golf fans grudgingly conceded today that Babe Didrickson Zaharias probably is the nation's top-ranking woman golfer.

"The Babe" defeated the hometown favorite, Betty Jameson, with an easy 10-stroke margin in yesterday's windup of their 72-hole challenge match. Mrs. Zaharias closed out the match on the 64th hole after Miss Jameson flubbed a six-foot putt, but they played out the remaining eight holes in deference to the 3,000 onlookers.

Walker, with his pitching brother, Morton, sparked the St. Louis National league pennant drives of 1942, '43 and '44. He was a big gun on attack as well as a brilliant strategist on defense. Batting .317 last year in the clean-up spot, he will leave what many consider an unpluggable gap on the team.
