Old Records May Fall As Young Athletes Meet In Track, Field Carnival

With 14 records at which to shoot, some of them of long standing, scores of high school athletes will come to La Grande Saturday to vie for honors in the 46th annual Eastern Oregon track and field meet.

If past performances can be taken as a criterion, either La Grande or Pendleton should carry off the honors, as they have been the most consistent performers winning the meet 25 times out of the 32 meets held since 1910. The meet was cancelled during the war years of 1919-29 inclusive.

La Grande has won the meet 13 times and Pendleton 12. Mac-Hi has won in 1936, 1941 and 1944; Baker is a two-time winner, 1912 and 1913, and Ontario also has won the meet twice, in 1911 and 1940.

La Grande's first victory was in 1910, and the local school did not repeat until 10 years later. After another interval of five years the Tigers won five years in a row, 1925-1929, inclusive. The winning streak was broken in 1930 by Pendleton, but the Tigers picked it up again in 1931-32-33, again in 1937, 1942 and 1943.

Buckaroos Look Good
Pendleton's victories were in 1914-15-16, 1921 to '24, inclusive, 1930, 1934-35, and 1938-39.

On the basis of this year's performances, the Buckaroos seem to have a slight edge by virtue of having won the Walla Walla relay last week, by one point over Mac-Hi, and the previous week's meet in Pendleton by a 3-point margin over La Grande. La Grande finished fifth at Walla Walla.

In any event, the afternoon's program of competitive events promises to be one well worth watching, and should be one of high entertainment interest irrespective of one's personal preferences and loyalties.

Pal Ruins Sox Hurler's Chance At Perfect Game

NEW YORK, May 2 (UP)—It was just a garden variety single and Pitcher Joe Haynes of the Chicago White Sox never gave it a second thought as the ball whistled past his ears and into center field.

That was in the third inning at Detroit yesterday, but before the finish that hit loomed bigger to Haynes than the mightiest home run ever smashed. For when it was all over and the White Sox were 5 to 0 winners over the Tigers, Haynes had come within just one pitch of turning in the first perfect no-hit game in the major leagues in exactly 23 years.

And there was irony at every turn in his failure to achieve the greatest distinction that can come to a major league pitcher. The author of the hit was his personal pal and ex-team mate, Jimmy (Skeeter) Webb.

It was on April 30, 1922, that Charley Robertson, also a White Sox pitcher, tossed baseball's last perfect game and as was the case yesterday, the Tigers provided the opposition in a 2 to 0 Chicago victory.

It was the second one-hitter pitched in the majors this season. Hank Wyse of the Chicago Cubs turned back the Pittsburgh Pirates with a lone single last Saturday.

In the only other major league game yesterday, the Boston Red Sox won their fourth straight game, topping the visiting Washington Senators, 5 to 4.

All other games were postponed because of rain.
