Stocks Advance on Favorable News

NEW YORK, May 3 (UP)—Industrial and utility stocks more than made up their losses of the past two sessions in a strong, moderately active stock market session today.

The industrial average reached a new high since September 9, 1937 while the utility was at its best since April 21, 1937. Rails also were higher but they failed to make up the sharp decline of Tuesday.

The general recovery was ascribed to an improved technical position after two sessions of consolidation, to the Truman announcement seeking a \$7,000,000,000 cut in war outlay, and to outlook for tax reductions for industry after V-E day. News continued favorable, including a rise in car loadings, and several improved corporation reports and dividend actions.

Butter Stocks Grow As Sales Slacken

PORTLAND, May 3 (UP)—Butter stocks today were reported to be accumulating among retailers and churners as consumers find it hard to find the necessary ration points. Prices were unchanged.

Trade in the egg market held firm as prices remained at OPA ceilings.

CHICAGO GRAIN
CHICAGO, May 3 (UP)—Less favorable crop reports from the southwest, expectations of heavy government flour orders over the week end, and prospects of enlarged export demand turned grain futures bullish on the board of trade today.

Wheat finished the day up 1/4 to 2 1/2 cents a bushel; corn up 1/4 to 1/2; oats up 1/4 to 1/2; rye up 1/4 to 1/2, and barley up 1/4 to 1/2.

The wheat market reflected the optimistic outlook on grain requirements abroad and the continued tight cash wheat markets at home. An added factor was assurance from the office of price administration that millers would be guaranteed costs on government flour orders.

German Surrender Of Last Fighting Forces Is Hinted

The British second army in the north has linked up with the Russians on the Baltic and at several other points northwest of Berlin, serving Denmark and Norway from the reic hand trapping countless thousands of enemy troops.

German Morale Broken
Everywhere German morale appeared to have broken on the Nazi announcement of Hitler's death.

Fighting in the northern reich apparently was all but ended. The British worked feverishly to disarm the hordes of German soldiers streaming through their lines.

Hamburg, the second city and greatest port of the reich, was occupied by the British without firing a shot after its Nazi defenders had declared it an 'open city.'

A broadcast by the Hamburg radio in the last hours it was controlled by the nazis indicated that surrender arrangements for the Czechoslovak rebout
