Oregon Waste Fat Salvage Mounts

PORTLAND, Ore., May 7 (UP) Oregon housewives turned into their butchers 237,741 pounds of used fats during March, enabling Oregon to attain its second highest monthly total since beginning of the fat-saving program nearly three years ago.

Only month to exceed March in collections was January of this year, when 237,857 pounds went to rendering companies, state salvage officials said.
