Denmark Seeks Seat at Security Conference Table

war, and would bring into the proposed organization so-called regional agreements.

Soviet approval now brings about a united front among the big four powers sponsoring the conference on proposed amendments to the basic Dumbarton Oaks plan on which the organization will be formed.

No Change in Council
It also was learned that the sponsoring powers have told Latin American delegates that they intend to keep the membership of the organization's security council at 11 members, as contemplated in the Dumbarton Oaks plan.

Five of the 11 would be permanent members—the United States, Britain, Russia, China and France—and the other six would be chosen on a rotating basis. Some Latin American delegations have been urging that the council's membership be increased to about 14.

Another departure was Belgian Foreign Minister Paul Henri Spaak. He left San Francisco last night by plane for Brussels, it was learned. Several other foreign ministers are expected to leave in the next few days.

The Polish dispute has left an ugly scar on the United Nations conference record here and it apparently is headed today for discussion of the Truman-Churchill-Stalin level.

American and British conference officials are happy to be free of it. They are convinced that no solution of the Polish problem will be obtained here. Some of them feel that the issue never should have been raised here in the first place.

In normal times, the United States averaged 11 pounds of coffee per person annually; in England, it was less than one pound.

"This must be a people's treaty. Unless it is, unless it is based upon full discussion and understanding by not only the governments but the peoples of the world, it will not be able to stand the stresses which will be placed upon it and ultimately it will fail."
