## Markets

### Stocks Break On War, Tax Rumors

NEW YORK, May 10 (UP)—Selling pressure increased on the stock market today. Prices had their worst break since March 28 on increased volume.

Two reasons stood out for the selling. The top one was the indication as expressed by Secretary Morgenthau that the administration will fight any proposals for a general tax relief at the present time. The second, losing in favor, was that the market was entitled to a drop at this time to consolidate the recent gains.

Added to these were rumors and guesses. Among the latter was the guess that Japan would not hold out long now that Germany is out of the conflict.

PORTLAND DAIRY

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10 (UP)—Despite a liberal receipt of egg supplies, no surplus was reported in the Portland market today, owing to steady demand. Egg prices are unchanged.

Butter supplies were gaining slowly, with prices unchanged. Butter—Cube 93 score 42 1/4; 92 score 42 1/4; 90 score 42; 89 score 41 1/2 pound.

Eggs—Prices to retailers: AA large 44c; A large 42c; medium, A 39c; small 35c dozen.

Cheese—Oregon triplets 27.2c; dairies 27.7c; Oregon loaf 27.9c. Jobbers pay 1/2c below quotations.

## President Is Guest At Capitol Luncheon

WASHINGTON, May 10 (UP)—The cloak of "security" which kept the American people pretty much in the dark about President Roosevelt's wartime travels was lifted today for President Truman.

With the end of the war in Europe, the office of censorship informed newspaper editors they may now tell where the president has been, where he is, and where he's going. But they can't tell the exact time he's going somewhere, or by what route.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, May 10 (UP)—Evening-up operations and liquidation prior to the government crop report depressed grain futures on the board of trade today. The bearish undertone stemmed from signs of easier cash markets and trade expectation of little reduction in the official wheat forecast due after the market close. Weakness in securities added to the heavy undertone.

Rye finished today off 1/4-2/4 cents a bushel; wheat off 3/4-1 1/4; corn up 1/4 to off 1/4; oats off 1/4-1 1/4; and barley off 1/2 to quoted up 1/4.

Long liquidation brought out stop-loss orders in the wheat pit break. Later prices steadied somewhat on milling demand. Early weakness reflected the lower cash prices brought on by prospects of more normal movement of grain since easing of the car shortage.

The mail rate was \$5 a half ounce at the beginning of the Pony Express service.
