Cardinal Boots Give Dodgers Victory 6 to 4

 NEW YORK, May 10 (UP)—In the Cardinal lineup that took a 6 to 4 beating from the Dodgers in Brooklyn yesterday, there were only four 1944 regulars, infielders Emil Verban, George Kurovski, and Ray Sanders and outfielder Johnny Hopp. Rookie catcher Del Rice let the Dodgers work a squeeze play for a run, failed to back up first another time, and appeared a little unsteady in handling pitcher Harry Brecheen. Right fielder Augie Bergamo, playing the sun field without glasses, let an easy pop-fly drop in front of him for a single that started a four run Dodger rally. Elvin (Buster) Adams, playing his first day as a Cardinal after moving over from the Phillies, over-charged a single and it went for three bases, two runs coming home.

The Detroit Tigers met their first test against the visiting New York Yankees when Paul (Dizzy) Trout gained a 4 to 1 seventh-inning victory. Thornton Lee won his third 1944 triumph for the White Sox beating the Athletics at Chicago, 6 to 4.

A single gave the Indians a 2 to 1 victory in the ninth over the Boston Red Sox at Cleveland. Allie Reynolds shaded Jim Wilson in a duel for his second victory, a six-hitter.

The Pittsburgh Pirates opened their road trip with a 9 to 5 victory over the Boston Braves, getting 13 hits off four pitchers.

The Phillies snapped Paul Derringer's four-game winning streak, topping the Chicago Cubs, 5 to 4, at Philadelphia.

Manager Mel Ott led the Giants to a 6 to 1 victory over the visiting Cincinnati Reds, hitting his 494th homer to tie the late Lou Gehrig of the Yankees for third place in the all-time major league homer records.

Washington at St. Louis in the American was rained out.

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Horsemen Rush Plans to Open Racing Meetings

NEW YORK, May 10 (UP)—Racing was getting set today for nationwide resumption after paying its war-time obligation to the government with a five-month shut-down. Narragansett in Rhode Island and Sportsman's park in Chicago will be in operation by this week-end. By the middle of next week Pimlico at Baltimore, and Churchill Downs at Louisville, Ky., will have their belated spring meetings under way, preliminary to the running of the two great three-year-old classics, the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness.

Plans were almost completed for the running of the 71st Kentucky Derby on June 2 and the Preakness at Baltimore was set tentatively for June 9. The third big race for three-year-olds, the Belmont stakes in New York, will be held June 3 or June 30. Jamaica will begin its spring meeting on May 1.

ARCADIA, Cal., May 10 (UP)—Scenic Santa Anita race track, shut down twice in the last three years on the eve of 55-day meetings, today is reported to have settled for a 35 or 40 day meeting to make way for a summer program at Bing Crosby's Pines Mar club.

At the same time, track officials expressed doubt they will be ready for a Monday opening and are expected to throw open the gates Tuesday or Wednesday if approval for a meet is granted by the state horse racing board tomorrow.
