## Earthworms Are Put to Work on Farm

### Huge Increase in Production Results

CLEVELAND (UP)—The simple little earthworm and trash farming can help destroy insects which plague the farmer and devour the crops, according to Christopher Gallup of North Stonington, Conn.  
Gallup, a self-styled gentleman farmer who turned his hobby into a career, is a former civil engineer turned insurance executive turned earthworm grower and trash farmer. He doesn't have much use for commercial fertilizers.

#### Foiled Farm Experts

Gallup lets earthworms do his fertilizing job for him. And what a job.

He bought a 175-acre farm for what he called a "plaything." The land was so worn out that agricultural experts said it wouldn't serve for anything better than reforestation.

But Gallup—without even plowing the land (he's against that too)—used trash cultivation and earthworms to make the land yield 196 bushels of corn per acre, 126 bushels more than it had previously been able to produce.

#### Drives Out Worms

Gallup is against plowing because it drives out the earthworms.

"It plows under the vegetation upon which the worms feed, shuts off the oxygen, and permits fungus growths to attack this vegetation," he said. "The worms won't eat the fungus. The worms go into the subsoil for the minerals they can't find in the surface. They absorb these minerals in their gizzards, and then cast them out on the surface. Why bury them with plowing?"

The Gallup farm has 130,000 worms to the acre and he said he hopes to raise the worm population to 1,500,000 per acre and then "the results will stagger the imagination."
