### Reopening of Gold Mines Proposed

WASHINGTON, May 12 (UP) — J. A. Krug, chairman of the war production board, today received a letter signed by Congressmen from 12 western states asking immediate reversion of the gold mine closing order.

The order, issued nearly 2 1/2 years ago, shut down the mines to guarantee manpower for mining of war-essential ores and minerals.

The letter, drafted by Rep. Clair Engle, D. Cal., said:  
"The letter mentioned the lifting of the horse racing ban. 'They say it's a question of manpower,' Engle said. 'Why don't they use bartenders and jockeys?'"

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### Surrender of Nazi Forces in Norway Is Parley Topic

conference in Scotland. All of Germany's remaining warships, including cruisers, destroyers, submarines and Torpedo boats were believed anchored in Norwegian harbors.

Submarines still at sea were surrendering in large numbers to allied warships and planes.

Mediterranean Cleared  
The clearing of Germans from the Mediterranean also was in progress. An Athens dispatch said allied planes had landed at Rhodes and Greek troops were disarming the enemy garrisons on Khios and Lero.

Life Not All Misery  
But life in the prison camp was not all grief and cruelty, he said. He told of one group of prisoners teaching the Japanese guards to sing "God Bless America." He said that while the Japs could not pronounce the English words, they could get the tune well enough to make it understandable. The soldiers did not understand what it was they were singing, but after a time their officers became aware of the nature of the song and halted further singing of it.

The prisoners also kept partially advised of the doings in the outside world through surreptitious operation of contraband radio receiving sets.

They knew nothing of plans for their liberation by American rangers and Filipino guerrillas, and were aware the hour of freedom was near only when they heard the shots and shouting as the camp guards were attacked.

Loses Teeth and Glasses  
Weedon said he was asleep at the time, having been feeling indisposed and gone to bed earlier than usual. When the liberators entered the camp someone woke him and told him to hurry he tried to find his false teeth and glasses, but was unable to do so in the darkness and had to leave without them.

Except for a frailty that seems unfitting for a man who has led the vigorous life of one of his age and calling, Weedon now shows outwardly little of the effects of his harrowing experiences of nearly three years in the hands of the Japanese.

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## Prisoner Asserts German Atrocities Worse Than Japs'

to return to the islands at the first opportunity to take care of personal affairs which were interrupted when the islands fell to the Japanese. Meanwhile, he plans to visit relatives in Spokane.

He went to the Philippines in 1939 to work for an army contractor after having lived in La Grande for nearly three years. He said he signed up to remain in the islands for a year, but, with the period of his captivity, he remained 48 years.

He said during the first two years of his captivity the food was "fair", Weedon said, although it consisted chiefly of rice, but during the last seven months in Cabantuan, it was an endless repetition of wormy rice, and it was during that period that the prisoners suffered the worst from malnutrition.

During the early period of captivity, he said, they occasionally received carabao meat from the Japanese, and they received only three Red Cross food packages, the first at Christmas time in 1942.

Many Prisoners Die  
Everyone in the camp had beri-beri and pellagra because of insufficiency of the diet, and many others had malaria and other diseases, which, aggravated by malnutrition caused 30 to 40 deaths daily during one period when the camp population was at its peak.

The common soldiers robbed the prisoners of all their valuables and although they had been searched repeatedly by their guards, new searches were made at frequent intervals.

American money was highly prized, and anyone fortunate enough to have it could obtain things to eat in the black market, he said.
