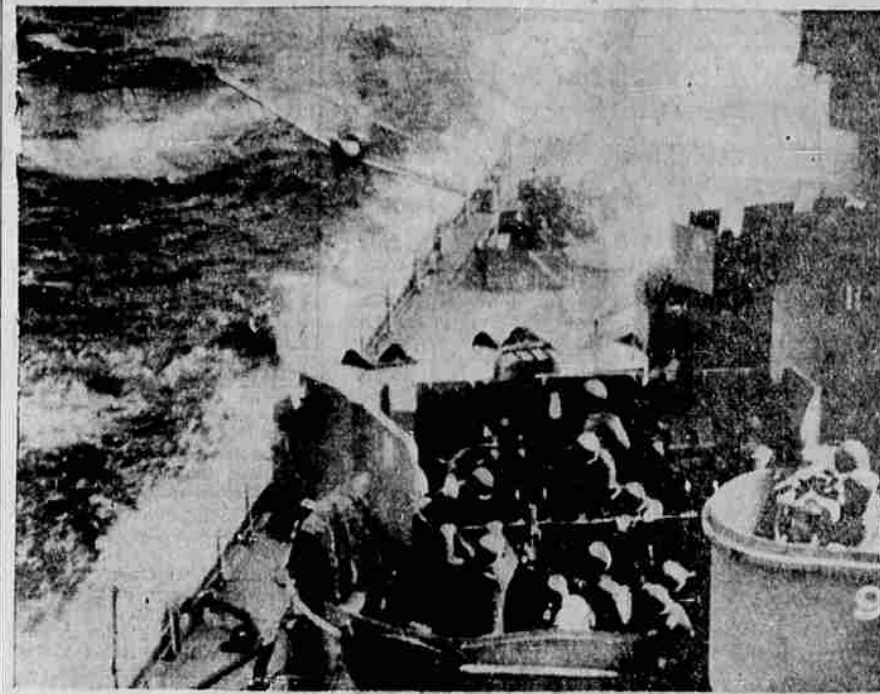

Man Facing Life Term Escapes From County Jail

(Continued from Page 1) to reach through the bars of the cell block door and manipulate the lock to the box in which the locking device is located.

After opening the lock, Durham apparently used a piece of metal about two inches wide and eighteen inches long to lift the lever which operates the bars on cell-block door.

Once outside the cell-block, he went to the rear and dug a hole through the brick wall separating the jail corridor from the office of County Treasurer Al Harlow.

Old Hole Used
The hole was partially broken through the wall in a previous attempt at jail-breaking. Breeshers said, leaving Durham but a single course of bricks to remove to complete the hole.

After getting into the treasurer's office, he let himself into the main corridor of the courthouse and then attempted to leave by the front door, where he was heard by Morgan.

Failing in this attempt, he asked Morgan about Sanderson's whereabouts (he had gone to his ranch near Summitville), and then smashed the rear window and fled.

After opening the cell-block doors, Durham asked Albert F. Bowman and "Cappy" Bushnell, the only other prisoners in the jail, if they wanted to escape, and upon being told they did not want to leave, he locked them in the cell block.

He took a loaf of bread, two cup cakes and a pound of raisins, the latter of which had been left for Bowman by his wife.

Leaves Farewell Note
When Breeshers arrived yesterday morning he found the iron bar from the bed and a cartoon that had been drawn by Durham in the box which controls the cell-block lock.

The cartoon was of an ape, very well drawn, with an inscription "wanted" in large letters at the top and Durham's signature and a message addressed to Lee Mosier, state police officer who participated in his arrest here several months ago.

He also left a letter addressed to Breeshers in Harlow's office in which he was somewhat boastful of his ability to escape from the state prison and the jail here, and added that "I could have went any time, but was waiting for good weather."

"Tell the state police boys to be a little easy with their trigger fingers," the letter said, "because I won't be packing any gun and am not dangerous. If I beat them I'll do it with my head and not a gun."

He expressed regret that it was Breeshers who was the victim of the escape, and expressed appreciation of the treatment accorded him here.

"It is not your fault," he added in a somewhat boastful vein, "that I am able to open this jail door. I think its been doing a pretty good job of keeping people in here for 37 years, but I happen to be about the only man in the world that can open that door from the inside. Mr. Halley at the state prison is
