Auto Registrations In State Mount

SALEM, Ore., May 15 (UP)—There were 3,594 more vehicles registered in Oregon in the first four months of 1945 than during the same period in 1944, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, jr., said today.

Total registration at the end of April totalled 393,085 vehicles, he said. Of these, 313,558 or 80 per cent, were passenger cars.

Lifting of Business Controls Predicted

WASHINGTON, May 15 (UP)—National Democratic Chairman Robert E. Hannegan told an audience of businessmen today that the post-war relationship of government to business would be keyed on cooperation instead of control.

"Once the threat of a war inflation is lifted, government controls will lift, too," he said, "and I hope that in those years, under President Truman, old uncertainties that plagued our nation's business and those who managed it will disappear."
