Processed Foods:
Book 4—Blue stamps H2 through M2 valid through June 2. Blue stamps N2 through S2 valid through June 30. Blue stamps T2 through X2 valid through July 31. Blue stamps Y2, Z, A1, B1, C1 valid through August 31.

Meat, Butter, Fats, Cheese:
Book 4—Red stamps Y5 through D2 valid through June 2. Red stamps E2 through J2 valid through June 30. Red stamps K2 through P2 valid through July 31. Red stamps Q2 through J2, valid through August 31.

Sugar:
Book 4—Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2. Sugar stamp 36 valid through August 31.

Shoes: Loose stamps invalid.
Book 3—Airplane stamps 1-2-3 now valid. New stamp valid Aug. 1.

Gasoline: Coupons not valid unless endorsed:

Scouts Will Aid In Reestablishing Foreign Activity

Participation of members and leaders of Blue Mountain council of Boy scouts in creation of a "world friendship fund" to help reorganize scouting in allied countries devastated by the war, has been announced by R. D. McDermott, scout executive for the area which embraces 13 counties in eastern Oregon and southeastern Washington.

McDermott said each scout and cub will be permitted to contribute whatever he wishes, and the troops and packs also may contribute as units.

The money will be used to provide cloth for uniforms, equipment, handbooks and other aspects of the scouting program. The "friendship" fund has been underwritten by the national council of scouts, and a similar movement has been started in Canada, where scout handbooks have been printed in foreign languages to help the boys in other lands.

MACARONI SUPREME
with pork sausage or ground meat
1 1/2 cups uncooked macaroni 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 lb. pork sausage or ground meat 1/4 teaspoon pepper
2 cups cooked tomatoes 2 cups grated American cheese
1 cup thinly sliced onion 1/2 cup grated American cheese

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender, about 20 minutes; drain. Brown sausage or meat balls in frying pan. In a well-greased casserole, arrange the meat balls; cover with a layer of onions; add macaroni. Add seasonings to tomatoes; pour over macaroni mixture. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes or until thoroughly heated and cheese melted. Serves 6.

SALAD BOWL
Toss together cut washed raw spinach, sliced radishes and sliced green onions with French dressing.

Compote of fresh or canned assorted fruits topped with whipped cottage or cream cheese. Crackers.
