U. S. Casualties in All War Theaters Pass 1,000,000

WASHINGTON, May 17 (UP)—U. S. combat casualties officially announced here totaled 986,214 today. This means that the actual total, including thousands not yet transferred to the records in Washington, has passed 1,000,000.

The 986,214 figure includes 107,215 for the navy, coast guard and marine corps, and 878,939 army casualties. The army total reflects actual fighting, only through mid-April. It does not include losses suffered since then in Europe, Okinawa and the Philippines.

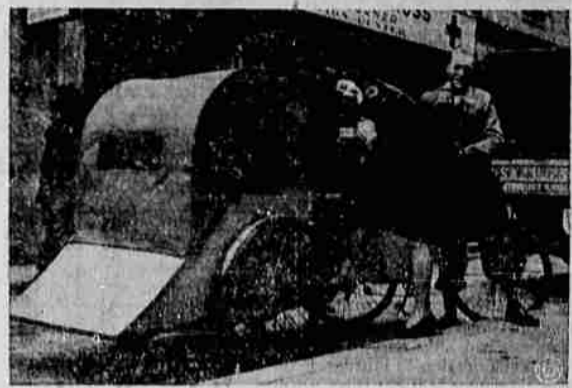
Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson reported that the Philippines campaign up to May 9 has cost 46,638 army casualties, including 10,432 killed, 35,699 wounded, and 507 missing. By contrast, the Japanese have lost 237,250 in counted dead and prisoners and many more who died where they could not be found and counted, Patterson said.

Patterson estimated that army forces in the Pacific have killed about 360,000 Japanese since the Guadalcanal campaign, not counting the fighting on Okinawa.

Of army wounded in all theaters, Patterson said 294,208 have returned to duty. Of soldiers taken prisoner, 19,876 have been exchanged or returned to army control.

Markets

Stocks Are Active As Prices Mount

NEW YORK, May 17 (UP)—Trading increased on the stock market today as prices continued to move higher in all departments.

Gains ranged to two points or more in special issues. The leading groups improved fractionally with the utility average reaching a new high since April 21, 1937. Dividend news continued to sway individual issues and to help the general market.

Sales totaled 1,370,000 shares compared with 1,210,000 yesterday. "Big board" bond sales aggregated \$10,150,000 against \$10,580,000. Curb stock turnover was 400,000 shares compared with 370,000.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, May 17 (UP)—Grain futures displayed ease with corn and May wheat relatively steady on the board of trade today. Caution prevailed with interest centered in the action of May rice.

Rye led the downturn with losses on the close ranging from 3/4 to 1 1/2 cents a bushel; wheat unchanged to off 1/4; corn up 1/4. Barley countered the trend with gains of 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 cents a bushel.

May wheat showed firmness most of the session but when prices reached \$1.77, a new crop high, offerings came out plentifully. May sold in exchange for July at around 12 1/2 to 12 3/4 cents difference.

Reports that frost failed to damage wheat tend to ease prices early in the day. Southwestern interests reported sales of 150,000 bushels of spot grain, and other scattered lots were noted at Kansas City.
