### Markets

#### Wage Talk Slows Stock Activity

NEW YORK, May 22 (UP)—A move to double the wage increase allowed under the little steel formula today arrested a modest rise on the stock market. Prices turned irregular and most of the leading groups registered declines. Selective buying went ahead in special issues and some of them had gains ranging to 3 points. Trading generally was dull.

Commonwealth and Southern topped the active list by virtue of a 20,000-share block. The rails provided several active issues. Leading steels gained slightly on the OPA move to allow steel price increases. The smaller steel unit shares barely held their own. Motors were irregular.

#### CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, May 22 (UP)—Eratric action of May rye, expiring at market close today, dominated grain futures on the board of trade today. Prices swung from early gains to stop-loss selling and a five-cent break. A late rally prompted gains ranging from a fraction to more than two cents in this delivery. May wheat rallied on the close and only May oats countered the upward trend.

Rye finished the day up 1/4 to 2 1/2 cents a bushel; wheat was up 1/4 to 1 1/2; corn unchanged to up 1/4; oats off 1/4 to up 1/2 and barley off 3/4 to 1 1/4.

#### CHINESE REOPEN RIVER

CHUNGKING, May 22 (UP)—Chinese forces have re-opened the Min river from the East China sea to a point 40 miles above Foochow, the Chinese central news agency said today.

The mouth of the Min river below Foochow lies northwest of Formosa and almost due west of the American-held Kerama islands and Okinawa.
