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## Red Sox Rookie Humbles Champion St. Louis Browns

NEW YORK, May 24 (UP)—Beating the champion St. Louis Browns, 4 to 1, at Boston yesterday was no ordinary achievement, but rookie pitcher Dave Ferriss expressed disappointment at the finish because he didn't blank them. He didn't miss by much, holding them to five hits and keeping them scoreless until the seventh inning when Mike Kreevich doubled and Gene Moore singled him home.

**Yanks Beat White Sox**  
The Yankees humbled the league leading Chicago White Sox, 5 to 3, at New York, making all their runs in the first inning to give Floyd Bevins his second win on a seven-hitter.

Detroit defeated the Athletics at Philadelphia, 7 to 1, regaining sole possession of second place from the Browns.

**Cleveland Topped the Senators** at Washington, 3 to 2, in a night game.

**Mungo Fans 10 Reds**  
In the National League Van Lingle Mungo pitched one of the best games of his long career, giving the New York Giants a 2 to 0 shutout at Cincinnati. Mungo yielded only three hits, and struck out 10 batters. He also doubled home one of the two Giants runs.

The Pittsburgh Pirates won a loosely played game in the 13th from the Boston Braves, 9 to 8, at Pittsburgh when Al Giofriddo singled home Johnny Barrett.

Rookie Jack Creel made a successful major league debut for the Cards at St. Louis, beating the Brooklyn Dodgers, 11 to 1. Claude Passeau of the Cubs gave his ailing arm a successful workout against the Philadelphia Phillies at Chicago, winning, 5 to 3, on seven hits.

## Padre's Hurler Fans 13 to Beat Oakland 2 to 1

Vallie Eaves, big Indian right-hander, turned in one of the nearest pitching jobs of the Pacific coast league campaign last night as the San Diego Padres downed the Oakland A's, 2 to 1. Eaves fanned 13 and even had the umpire mystified. They suspected that he was throwing the outlawed spitter but failed to detect any signs to this effect despite repeated examinations of the horseshoe.

The Padres tallied the winning run in the fourth inning on Lou Vezelich's single, outfielder Norm Dewese's miscue and a solid basehit by Del Ballinger. Len Gilmore, ace of the Oakland staff, was the losing hurler.

**Beaver's Lead Trimmed**  
The Seattle Rainiers cut Portland's league lead to 3½ games by taking both games of a doubleheader with Los Angeles. The Suds won the opener, 5-4, even though Doc Greene smashed a three-run homer for the Angels, and came back with a 2-0 victory in the nightcap. Keith Frazier and Carl Fischer were the winning pitchers.

The talented Hollywood Stars battled 11 innings to defeat Sacramento, 6 to 5. With Brooks Holder on first base, Jimmy Grant of the Solons fielded Manager Buck Fausett's bunt but threw the ball into right field, allowing Holder to gallop all the way in. Joe Mishasek outlasted four Sacramento twirlers.

The Portland-San Francisco game was rained out.

## Cochran Regains Lead in Tourney

SAN FRANCISCO, May 24 (UP)—Walker Cochran of San Francisco, today held a five-point lead over Willie Hoppe of New York in their transcontinental three-cushion billiard tournament after last night's game here.

Cochran took yesterday's block 60 to 39 in 35 innings but in the evening block Hoppe won, 60 to 52 in 41 frames. At the end of 36 games total point score was Cochran 4,580 and Hoppe 4,575. Four more games remain to be played in the series.

## Hangman Himmler Commits Suicide

thoroughly. They went over his feet, hands, legs and back and then ordered him to open his mouth.

**Swallows Poison Potion**  
In despair, Himmler jerked his head away and bit into the hidden vial.

The poison took effect almost instantaneously. He fell writhing to the floor and died there within 15 minutes, despite all efforts to revive him by artificial respiration.

Doctors continued to work over the body for another 25 minutes before he finally was pronounced dead.

British intelligence officers confirmed the dead gestapo chief's identity.

Himmler was arrested by two British Tommies guarding a bridge at Bremervoerde. He was dressed in civilian clothes. The familiar tooth brush mustache had been shaved off, a black patch was over one eye, and a pair of horn-rimmed glasses had been substituted for his rimless spectacles.

His suicide left only Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop of the Nazi hierarchy still to be accounted for.

## Production of Eggs By Oregon Hens is Near Normal Rate

PORTLAND, Ore., May 24 (UP)—Oregon hens laid a total of 55 million eggs in April, after putting the same number in the hay during March.

However, according to records of the United States department of agriculture, they fell off 5 per cent from April of last year. Total production for the year's first four months was 195,000,000 eggs.

The rate of egg production during April was 18.54 eggs per hen, compared with 18.48 last year and 19 on the average. There were 2,983,000 hens and pullets of laying age on Oregon farms in April. This was six per cent below a year ago.

## Malheur County Gets Nazi Prisoners

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 24 (UP)—J. R. Beck, state farmer labor supervisor in the Oregon state college extension service, reported today the arrival of some 500 German prisoners of war in Malheur county to work in the sugar beet and onion fields.

They will block and thin 18,000 acres of sugar beets, and weed 2500 acres of onions. Later, they will work on other row crops.

They will be housed at camps in Vale and Nyssa, and will be in complete charge of army personnel.
