caught the gun tub of the number 13 gun.

The plane nosed over and part of it fell into the water. However the wing, propeller and part of the pilot's body remained on the deck of the LST.

Commenting on the conduct of the crew throughout this action and the time they served together, the skipper of the LST said:

"I have known these men well, I respect all of them because their attitude and actions have demanded the respect of all fair minded men. I prefer that my name not be used as my reward came each day in the cooperation and respect that the crew has afforded me. I believe it can be truthfully said that no ship regardless of size or fire power fought more desperately to survive."

Markets

Upward Trend In Stocks Continues

NEW YORK, May 29 (UP)—Stocks advanced today for the fifth consecutive session, reaching further new high ground for more than seven years, while commodity prices improved and listed bonds approached their recent 30-year mark.

Stock market sentiment was bolstered largely by yesterday's optimistic view of the reconversion period taken by WPB Chief J. A. Krug, recent favorable railroad and corporation earnings statements and the moves of a number of companies to reduce their debt and strengthen their capital positions.

Sales totaled 1,800,000 shares compared with 1,570,000. "Big board" bond sales aggregated \$1,700,000 against \$9,780,000. Curb stock turnover amounted to 410,000 shares compared with 360,000.
