## Chiang Resigns As Chinese Premier

(Continued from Page 1) — and named Wong Wen-Hao, economic minister and chairman of the war production board, to succeed him.

A Washington dispatch said Dr. Kung resigned because poor health prevented him from returning to China from the United States at this time. Dr. Kung also resigned from the concurrent post of governor of the central bank of China, but remained Chiang's personal representative to President Truman, Washington said.

**Retain Other Posts**  
Both Chiang and Kung also retained numerous other lesser offices in the Chinese government. Chiang also is supreme commander of allied forces in China.

The changes were believed the first of several in China's government.

Soong, a brother of Madame Chiang, headed the Chinese delegation to the San Francisco world security conference. His formal appointment as premier is expected to strengthen his hand in dealing with other members of the big five—the United States, Britain, Russia and France.

It also may clear the way for an agreement with the Chinese communist regime at Yenan.

## France Is Ordered To Halt Hostilities In Syria; Lebanon

(Continued from Page 1) French reinforcements to Syria and Lebanon to back up France's demand for strategic bases in the former mandated countries.

The ancient city of Damascus was aflame from French bombing and shelling, and Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden announced in commons that the situation there had become worse in the past 12 hours.

Eden said late advice from the British minister in Damascus reported heavy and continued fighting in the city throughout last night and early today.

**Egypt Is Alarmed**  
Britain received a note from the Egyptian government expressing alarm about the Syrian situation. The British cabinet was said to have taken steps at once to inform Egypt of the British viewpoint.

The Damascus parliament building, previously reported occupied by the French, was said to have been ruined by shelling, mortar fire and bombing. This was the first report of aerial attacks on the capital, although French planes were reported to have bombed Hama.

## Market Quotations

### Small Losses Mark Wall Street Trading

NEW YORK, May 31 (UP) — Following recent custom after a few days of market rise Washington today circled around rumors that stricter margin controls were in the offing. Simultaneously stocks receded on reduced volume.

Wall Street experts were unwilling to concede that the recession coming on top of the margin rumors was anything but a coincidence. They held that the list was entitled to a technical correction at this stage of the rise.

Losses generally were small and partly recouped before the close. Recently strong railroad shares had declines of as much as 2 1/4 points in Santa Fe at the lows. The latter came back part way. Steels yielded small fractions on dull trading. Oils also lost a little. Airlines were off as much as 1 1/4 points. Utilities were featured by strength in Columbia Gas preferred issues.

**CHICAGO GRAIN**  
CHICAGO, May 31 (UP) — Wheat, all deliveries, rose to new seasonal highs on the board of trade today before weakening under profit-taking. An increase in the ceiling price of wheat and heavier commercial demand for flour were stimulating factors. Corn was firm and other grains weak before the close.

Late selling by southwestern interests reversed early strength in the wheat pit. Prices dropped about two cents from early high levels. Strong cash markets, heavy export demand and the announcement of the anticipated ceiling hike continued to give a firm undertone despite price fluctuations.
