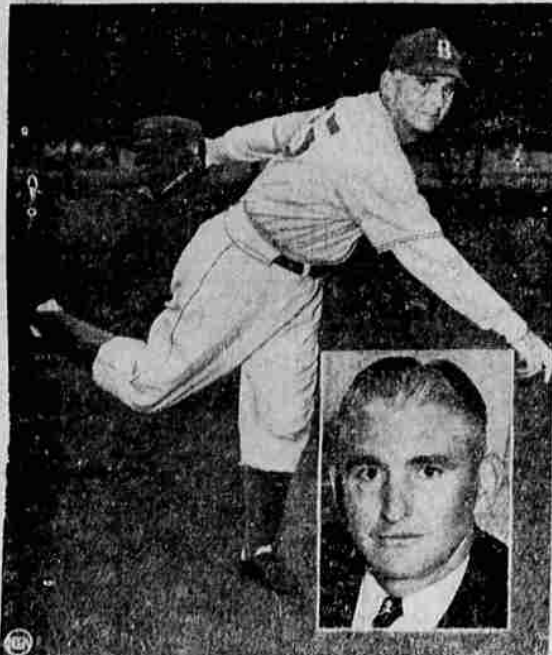

## Major Leagues Draw Huge Holiday Crowds

NEW YORK, May 31 (UP)—America's first holiday since victory in Europe brought a quarter of a million fans to major league baseball games yesterday.

Only two teams, the Washington Senators in the American and the Cincinnati Reds in the National, made clean sweeps of their twin bills.

### Compulsory Gym Practice Proposed For All Youth

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31 (UP)—Walter (Duster) Mails, the one-time big league mounce, now serving with the Red Cross overseas, calls for compulsory athletics for every grade and high school student in the land in post-war days.

Mails, who used to hurl for the Cleveland Indians, and who served in the marines until getting a discharge about six months ago, says such a program would strengthen the nation's manpower for future emergencies.

"Nowaday," Mails contends, "students who need conditioning most are being ignored by coaches who have time only for those better physically and mentally equipped for sports. Only active participation in athletics, to instill the spirit of hard play—not just gym once or twice a week—will build Americans into men no enemy can ever catch again as decadent and weak."

Mails' program, as outlined to newsmen in Honolulu, now is being worked out in detail and would be arranged according to school grades, growing progressively more stringent each year. He would make it mandatory that each student complete his time in athletics as he would in any other subject and that only those he excused who are physically incapable as determined by medical examination.

### Seals Crowd Oaks By Taking Both Holiday Games

The San Francisco Seals, who looked like a cinch second division standby only a few weeks ago, were riding in the Pacific Coast league's fourth spot today, only a game behind the third-place Oakland Acons.

The Seals came from behind in the late innings twice yesterday to annex a doubleheader from the Oaks in their first "grudge" series of the season. The Seals took the opener, 6-5, and the nightcap, 5-4.

#### Other Teams Split

All the other Memorial Day twin bills were split. Hollywood whipped Los Angeles, 5-0, and then received for a 4-0 defeat; Seattle nosed out Portland, 3-2, but the Beavers won the second game, 4-2, to maintain their game and one-half leadership; San Diego stopped Sacramento, 5-2, and the Solons came back for a 4-1 triumph in the finale.

Willie Enos' single in the last of the ninth scored Johnny Trutta from second with the run that gave San Francisco a first game decision. With the bases loaded in the eighth frame of the nightcap—which was supposed to go only seven cantos—Mitch Chetkovich walked Johnny Cavalli, Floyd Ehrman and Bob Barthelsson were the winning pitchers and the losses were charged to Italo Chelini and Chetkovich.

Newt Kimball scattered seven Los Angeles blows for Hollywood in the opening engagement. Buck Fausett, manager of the tailend Stars, hit a homer and two singles. Red Adams was the mound ace for the Angels in the second game, limiting the opposition to six hits. Ray Viers drove in two runs with a triple.

Hal Suena singled to score Chuck Aleno with the run that gave Seattle its win over Portland. Joe Demoran was on the hill for his fifth victory. The Beavers hammered Hal Turpin for 13 hits in the second game.

Indian Valle Eaves notched his 11th win of the season as San Diego stopped Sacramento. A triple by Lou Vezelich paced the Padre attack. Giles Knoxl's threw a six-hitter at San Diego in the second game, which was highlighted by Lilo Maveucci's three-bagger and Ed Zipay's double.

### Mayer Nag Stages Strong Comeback

ARCADIA, Calif., May 31 (UP)—A record Memorial Day crowd of 76,400 yesterday saw Louis B. Mayer's six-year-old Thumbs Up climax his comeback campaign with a four-length victory in the \$25,000 added San Pasqual handicap at Santa Anita.

The crowd, which track officials said set a new American record and broke the track record of more than 60,000 set in 1940 when Sealant won the Santa Anita handicap, bet \$3,051,770 on the eight race card.

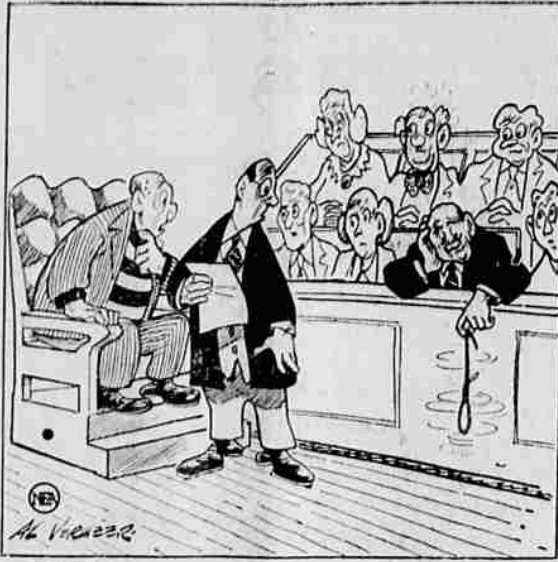

### TODAY'S SPORT PARADE

NEW YORK, May 31 (UP)—Racing luck is something like love. Regardless of your wealth, you have it when you need it—or you don't—three very wealthy men found out over the holiday.

Bill Helis, oil magnate whose income is estimated at \$37,000 a day, heard the roar of 64,537 voices at Jamaica as his two surviving derby eligibles—Greek Warrior and Adonis—bit the dust.

But Fred W. Hooper, the big bronzed southern contractor and cattleman—who never had a thoroughbred on a track until last year—listened to the Jamaica roar as his Hoop jr. turned in a winning upset in the second section of the Wood memorial, thereby qualifying for the Kentucky derby on June 9.

In similar fashion, the wealthy Col. C. V. Whitney saw his Jeep qualify for the "Run of the Roses" by winning the first section of the Wood memorial—a happy interlude after Whitney's bitter disappointment last year when jinxed-out Pukka Gin broke down before the derby.

Hooper is confident Hoop jr. will win the Kentucky classic because the colt has been lucky and because it has "done everything we have asked."

He paid \$10,200 at Lexington, Ky., two years ago for a colt that attracted both him and his trainer, Ivan Parks. The colt was Hoop jr.—bay son of Sir Gallahad One Hour. They liked him because of his profile, his behavior and his breeding. Hooper bought 21 other yearlings, 12 mares and the stallion Hollywood, but Hoop jr. was the apple of his eye.

Hoop jr. had a good record as a two-year-old last year, winning two and placing three times in five starts. He worked well this spring, but made a poor showing in a six-furlong event on May 22. This made him comparatively lightly regarded for his section of the Wood yesterday. But he took the lead and never was headed, finishing the mile and 1-16 in 1:45—four-fifths of a second faster than Whitney's Jeep. He beat out the Christiana stables' favored Alexis, one of the top averages of '44 and winner of two straight this spring at Pimlico. Hoop jr. will be shipped to

Louisville for the derby today. Col. Whitney's Jeep will be shipped next Tuesday or Wednesday.

### Carrier Repairs to Cost \$45,000,000

NEW YORK, May 31 (UP)—It will cost \$45,000,000 to repair the U.S.S. Franklin, the gallant aircraft carrier hit by a "lucky bomb" off Japan.

Lt. Cmdr. Robert C. Downes, its damage control officer, said the damaged carrier which made its way to Brooklyn navy yard after an enemy bomb set off its ammunition and gasoline stores, taking a large toll of lives, was still "\$30,000,000 worth of good ship."

### Recruits Sought for State Guard Units

PORTLAND, Ore., May 31 (UP)—Maj. H. C. Tobin, executive officer of the Oregon state guard, today issued a call for recruits for the cavalry units.

Maj. Tobin said discharged veterans were wanted particularly to enroll in the cavalry since it offers them a chance to learn riding.

### Player Subsidizing Banned By Big Ten

CHICAGO, May 31 (UP)—The Big Ten conference, in taking an iron stand against recruiting and subsidizing of athletes by its member schools, is putting itself on trial before the nation's sports fans in one of the most interesting tests in intercollegiate athletic history.

The Big Ten's governing body clarified the conference's stand on amateurism recently by adopting a new code which puts sharper teeth in its former "purity policy." The heart of the Big Ten's new rules says, in effect: "A student shall not be paid, directly or indirectly, for participation in intercollegiate athletics nor shall any member school—either through its own representatives or alumni—take the initiative in making contacts with
