

Doughboys Will Show How War Bonds Do Battle

With the sounds of battle in his ears, the picture of attacking infantryman in his eyes and the smell of burnt powder in his nostrils the average American soon will have a better idea of what his war bond purchases mean.

For the 7th war loan, army ground forces will send a team of 39 experienced infantrymen to La Grande June 15 to acquaint the public with infantry fighting and infantry weapons. There will be no charge for the program at the high school athletic field called, "Here's Your Infantry" it is a grandstand seat to war itself, colorful, exciting, noisy, thrilling and an experience that no American will want to miss.

The infantrymen attack a Jap pillbox with rifles, machineguns, mortars, bazookas and flame throwers just as they are doing in the Pacific today. The attack is the highlight of a demonstration which includes the display and explanation of infantry weapons and the exhibition of equipment and ration.

Twenty-five of these infantry units are touring the nation to bring to the public a graphic portrayal of why war cost what it does — and why it must be paid for in war bonds.

A few of these units were used during the 6th war loan, Treasury Secretary Henry Morganthau, jr., said of their work in selling war bonds: "Here's Your Infantry" proved to be the outstanding national promotion of the drive."

"Trained at Fort Benning," famed infantry school in Georgia, the units are made up of men recently returned from combat. They know their weapons from actual experience in battle. All of them wear battle ribbons, most of them bought war bonds overzealously.

The exhibits will be on a grand scale and the public will be permitted to handle weapons, watch them as they are assembled and disassembled. The audiences will also receive a full and dramatic explanation and running commentary on the actual pillbox assault from a trained announcer.

This is the first time that the average citizen will be able to see at first hand how the weapons he buys perform in actual combat.

Attempt to Incite Uprising in India Fails; Japanese Puppet Army Scattered

NEW DELHI, June 4 (UP) — The puppet army of 35,000 Indian renegades who deserted to the Japanese when Singapore fell in 1942 finally has been scattered and virtually disbanded after three years of futile effort to stir India to revolt.

With the dissolution of the traitor force, British military authorities permitted correspondents to reveal for the first time the full story of the formation and fall of this "Indian national army" that was raised to "liberate" India for the Japanese.

Actually, the army fought only one small campaign, early in 1944, when it joined the Japanese in the unsuccessful invasion of India's manpower province. The Indian people ignored their call to revolt, many of their officers surrendered to the British, and the movement finally fell apart.

The puppet army actually was initiated by an obscure Sikh officer of the 14th Punjab regiment, a Capt. Mohan Singh, who was captured by the Japanese when Singapore fell on Feb. 15, 1942.

On the same day, Singh began recruiting among his fellow-captives with a view to fighting the British-Indian armies alongside the Japanese and instigating other Indian troops to desert.

By November, 1942, however, Singh had been replaced at the head of the army by Ras Behari Bose, a prominent Indian revolutionary who had been living in Japan since 1915 after throwing a bomb at Lord Hardinge, then viceroy of India.

Bose claimed to have enlisted 16,000 of the 70,000 Indian soldiers taken by the Japanese and the movement was gathering strength. In December, 1942, however, it was disbanded suddenly by the Japanese after Bose arrested Singh for permitting his aides to communicate with the British authorities in India.

It was revived again in June, 1943, when another and more zealous Indian renegade reached the far east. He was Subhas Chandra Bose, Indian left wing leader and one-time president of the Indian congress, who was expelled by Mohandas Gandhi and fled to Berlin.

Immediately on his arrival in Japanese-occupied territory, Subhas Bose ousted Behari Bose from the leadership of the Indian independence league and began an active propaganda campaign to raise money and recruits for the national army.

Subhas Bose's forces suffered their heaviest defeat at the end of April, 1944, when they were caught with the Japanese in Manipur province. Several hundred of their officers and men were killed or captured there, and in the subsequent retreat into Burma they lost hundreds more.

Bose made a last attempt to revive his prestige with the Japanese in the final stages of the central Burma campaign, but he failed dismally and his forces broke up. Later, rumors reached India that he had died in exile.

Canning Sugar Cut Brings Protests

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4 (UP) — Northwest housewives today were protesting the surprise cut in home canning sugar announced Saturday for six western states by the OPA and sought information on sugar substitutes.
