Coast Leaders of Red Cross Here For Conference

Here for the conference with the district unit leaders are the following Red Cross officials from the area headquarters at San Francisco: Edwin H. Carroll, assistant Pacific area manager; E. S. Osborn, regional director of chapter service; North Baker, assistant director of public information; B. W. Carpenter, assistant director of first aid, water safety and accident prevention; Mrs. Violet Knight, assistant administrator of volunteer special services, and Miss Edith Olson, deputy director of nursing services.

The session tomorrow morning will be devoted to nursing service, and volunteer special services will be the subject of the afternoon meeting. Water safety, accident prevention and first aid will be taken up Saturday morning, and disaster relief at the closing session that afternoon.

Union county chapter representatives at the meetings will include the staff assistants, chairmen of the various services and any other interested persons.

Lower City Tax Rate Indicated By New Budget

tion of the existing facilities.

It was revealed that the city is desirous of purchasing the lots on Washington street, immediately behind the present city building. With this land, the city would have a site adequate to the city's requirements for many years, and when the present building is outgrown, it would be used for a new and larger structure.

Capital Outlays Planned

Increases are made in most of the departmental budgets, some of them of substantial amounts, but in several instances the money to cover the increases will come from reserve or sinking funds and will therefore, not be reflected in the year's taxes.

One such item is \$15,000 to be taken from the sinking fund for a community swimming pool, to which \$12,500 additional will be raised to provide this civic improvement and materials become available during the year.

Similarly, \$25,000 is budgeted for improvement and expansion in the water department, including an increase in the capacity of the Beaver Creek reservoir. In all instances of capital investment, the budget items are included on an "if and when" basis, the expenditures to be made provided wartime limitations on materials, equipment and supplies are available during the ensuing fiscal year.

Street Equipment Provided

In the street department budget \$2,300 is set up for new street signs, \$8,000 for a tractor, \$11,000 for a power shovel and \$4,455 for trucks, none of which was carried in the current year's budget.

The street department budget also includes minor wage adjustments which make the new budget \$24,875 higher than that of the previous year.

Many Increases Small

Other net increases are shown as follows: general government, \$265; city building \$120; police department, \$4,700; fire department, \$2,020; sewer department, \$2,000; park department, \$445; library, \$255; airport, \$3,275. The latter including a \$6,500 payment on hangars and an increase of \$800 in maintenance costs.

The road department for which \$15,140 was budgeted during the past year, is given \$36,200 for next year, the entire sum being offset by gas tax revenue, county road fund appropriations and unexpended cash balances.
