## Morse Suggests Bowles Quit OPA, Charges 'Bungling'

WASHINGTON, June 12 (UP)—Sen. Wayne Morse, R., Ore., yesterday called on price administrator Chester Bowles to resign "in the public interest" if it's a question of "having your own way or resigning."

Morse read to the senate an exchange of letters between him and Bowles. The price administrator had asked the senator for "full and complete retraction" of a statement made by Morse last week to the effect that Bowles' promises weren't "worth the paper they are written on."

In his reply, Morse asserted that OPA had a "high and mighty" attitude toward congress and by "bungling" the lamb price situation in Oregon had caused great losses to producers.

In addition to inviting Bowles to resign if the other alternative was having his own way, Morse accused OPA of permitting itself to be used politically by Oregon Democrats last fall.

"A fair share of the blame for that," he told Bowles, "must be laid at your door."

## House Committee Rebuffs Truman On FEPC Proposal

WASHINGTON, June 12 (UP)—The house rules committee, rejecting a plea by President Truman, refused today to permit the house to consider a bill for establishing a permanent anti employment practice commission.

Committee Chairman Adolph J. Sabath, III, said the vote was six to six. He would not say how the votes were divided among the eight democrats and four republicans.

Sabath said the committee's action would not "foreclose" any future action on the bill. But, he added, "nothing will be done about it for some time."

It would be possible for proponents of the permanent FEPC bill to try to bring it before the house through a petition discharging the rules committee from further consideration of it. This is a long procedure, requiring 218 signatures to the petition, but it was effective in the case of the anti-poll tax bill.

## Moderate Advances Mark Stock Trading

NEW YORK, June 12 (UP)—Stocks made a small advance today after a substantial recession yesterday. Trading lightened moderately.

There was nothing in the news to affect the list but the trading element could find no reason for the previous session's decline either so a few resumed buying operations. Selling dried up and prices moved ahead in most sections.

Leading issues were fractionally higher. Special stocks had gains running to more than a point and Standard Gas issues rose as much as 4 points in the preferreds.

Rails were better as a group. Higher priced motors held around the previous close. Steels firmed. Oils balanced off small gains and losses. Packing stocks made small net gains.

## CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, June 12 (UP)—Senate action guaranteeing farm profits, shortage of grain cars and export prospects offset any bearish sentiment on the board of trade today prompted by the crop estimate. Oats eased, counter to the trend.

Rye established strong gains on the close and wheat finished mixed. Wheat wound up the day off 1/4 to up 1/2 cent a bushel; corn off 1/4 to up 1/4; oats off 1/4 to 3/4; rye up 1/4 to 1 1/4, and barley unchanged to off 1/4.

Corn continued firm reflecting the scarcity of cash offerings, and the slow movement of grain from the farm.

## PORTLAND DAIRY

PORTLAND, June 12 (UP)—Butter production is decreasing sharply in the northwest but supplies are still piling up from lack of civilian demand. Prices were unchanged on the Portland dairy market.

Eggs were still in short supply and live poultry was hard to find.

Butter—cube 93 score 42 1/2; 92 score 42 1/2; 90 score 42; 89 score 41 1/2 pound.

Eggs — Prices to retailers: AA large 46c; A large 44c; medium small 37c dozen.

Cheese—Oregon triplets, 27.2c; Daisies 27.7c; Oregon loaf 27.9c. Jobbers pay 1/2c below quotations.

## Return of Hitler Is Predicted By Hidden Nazi Radio

12th ARMY GROUP HEADQUARTERS, Germany, June 12 (UP)—A Nazi radio operating in the Weidburg area of southern Germany was revealed today to be broadcasting to the German people:

"Hitler will return! Germany will save herself!"

American military intelligence agents were endeavoring to trace the clandestine station. Weissenburg lies north of Augsburg.

The Germans have reported that Adolf Hitler was killed in Berlin, but Marshal Gregory K. Zhukov, commander of Russian occupation forces, said the Soviets have been unable to identify any body definitely as that of Hitler.

Zhukov suggested that Hitler fled Berlin for a hideout somewhere in Europe just before the Nazi capital fell.

Twelfth army group headquarters also revealed that Rudolf von Ribbentrop, a son of Hitler's foreign minister, Joachim von Ribbentrop, had been found in a divisional prisoner of war cage in the third army area. The Elder Ribbentrop still was at large.

Baldur von Schirach, a Hitler youth leader, was captured at Schwaz, Austria, in a d quarters said.

## Japan Calls Women As Guerillas To Oppose Invaders

LONDON, June 12 (UP)—Both houses of the Japanese diet formally surrendered their powers to Premier Adm. Kantaro Suzuki today at the close of an extraordinary four-day session convoked to mobilize the entire nation for invasion.

Suzuki emerged from an unexpectedly bitter parliamentary debate armed with dictatorial powers for the duration of the war.

Simultaneously, radio Tokyo revealed that the diet in its last official act passed an emergency mobilization bill conscripting all males from 15 to 65 and all women from 25 to 45 for service in a new home guard. Ultimately, the age brackets for women will be revised to 17 to 40, Tokyo said.

The Japanese Domei news agency said the home guards would serve as guerillas in event of invasion, and called upon them to arm themselves with family swords, bamboo spears or any other weapons available.

## 3,600-Mile Flight Of Great Fleet of B-29s Revealed

GUAM, June 12 (UP)—One hundred fifty Superforts making up the entire 58th bombardment wing of the 20th army air force have joined Marianas-based B-29s after an historic 3,600 mile mass flight from India to Tinian without the loss of a single plane, it was officially announced today.

The 58th, oldest of all the B-29 organizations, joined Maj. Gen. Curtis Le May's "Japan Express" forces in the Marianas and has been taken into the 21st bomber command, it was revealed on the first anniversary of the inauguration of B-29 combat against Japan.

Ramey's Superfortresses made the 3,600 mile flight over enemy-held territory was accomplished without the loss of a single plane.

The 58th's migration was made in two laps. The first brought the mass of B-29s "over the hump" to an airfield in the mountains of China. The second brought it the remaining 2,600 miles to Tinian.

This major shift was completed in April, and the 58th has been in the thick of mass fire raids on Japanese cities since then.
