Wickard Endorsed For REA Office

WASHINGTON, June 14 (UP)—The senate agriculture committee by a 11-to-6 vote today approved the nomination of Claude R. Wickard to be rural electrification administrator.

The committee action came after three days of hearings held at the request of rural electrification cooperatives in the middle west and south. Witnesses charged Wickard with "political domination" of REA during his term as secretary of agriculture.

The senate is expected to act on the nomination tomorrow.

Gen. Doolittle Says B-29 "Marvelous"

WASHINGTON, June 14 (UP)—Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle, commander of the eighth airforce, arrived here early today after flying from Seattle in a B-17 bomber.

In Seattle, Doolittle made his first flight in a B-29 Superfortress.

"It's a marvelous airplane and handles nicely," Doolittle said, after a few minutes at the controls of the giant ship that dwarfed the B-17 the general flew in the first raid on Tokyo in 1942. B-29s are now hitting Tokyo.

Doolittle was commander of the eighth airforce in Europe. He is destined for a Pacific command.

For breakfast—CORN PANCAKES
 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 2 tbsps. sugar
 1/2 cup corn meal 1 tsp. salt
 1 1/2 tbsps. baking powder 2 eggs
 1/2 tsp. soda 2 1/2 cups milk
 2 tbsps. melted shortening or margarine

Sift flour, measure, and sift again with corn meal, baking powder, soda, sugar, and salt. Beat egg yolks, add milk and combine with dry ingredients, beating until smooth. Add melted butter or margarine and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Drop by tablespoonfuls on moderately hot, lightly-greased griddle or heavy frying pan. Turn cakes when bubbles form on top surface. Bake until golden brown. Serve with equal amounts of melted butter or margarine and heated syrup. Makes 10 to 12 medium-size cakes.

For his favorite dinner—Chicken Fricassee or Beef Stew with Dumplings.

DUMPLING QUICKIE
 2 cups biscuit mix 1 cup milk

Place mix in bowl; add milk all at once; stir only until all of the flour is dampened. Drop dumplings by tablespoonfuls on gently boiling stew or liquid in large kettle with tight-fitting cover; steam 15 minutes or until done, without removing cover. Makes 12 medium-size dumplings.
