MILTON, Pa., June 15 (UP)—The Buffalo-bound Dominion Express of the Pennsylvania railroad derailed near here today and 17 bodies were recovered from the wreckage five hours after the accident.

WASHINGTON, June 15 (UP)—The White House announced today that President Truman has accepted "with regret" the resignation of Abner H. Ferguson, administrator of the federal housing administration, to be effective July 1.

State Funds To Go Into U. S. War Bonds

SALEM, Ore., June 15 (UP)—The Oregon bond commission voted today to invest \$11,205,000 of the state's spare cash in Uncle Sam's war bonds, it was announced by State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott. Nine million dollars will be invested in short time securities with the remainder going into long time bonds. Eight million dollars of the total will come from the state's general fund which on May 31 contained more than \$32,000,000.

Many Are Killed in Flensburg Blast

LONDON, June 15 (UP)—An Exchange telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen said today that almost 600 German naval personnel and spectators were killed at Flensburg Thursday by two explosions caused by mines, presumably dropped as they were being removed from a large store.

Carrier Saratoga Back After Japs After Bad Beating

(Continued from Page 1) rier task group northeast of the bloody little island when nine or 10 suicide bombers picked her out. They began attacking at 5 p.m.

The Saratoga was launching her own planes when the assault came. Her guns and aircraft shot down four of the attackers. Four others got through and made crash hits. A fifth, knocked down alongside, bounced crazily on the waves and slammed into the carrier. It exploded and ripped a large hole in the Sara's side.

A sixth enemy plane scored a bomb hit that blew a hole below the water line of the vessels rupturing many fuel lines. One of the crashing attackers had smashed into the hangar deck and exploded, starting a roaring fire. Water rushed in the gaping hole. The ship took on a six degree list.

A nightmarish spray of "fireworks" followed, Comdr. R. P. Beebe, Coronado, Calif., told reporters while the ship was being repaired here.

Jap Troops Are Slain By Officers

(Continued from Page 1 and three miles wide. At the end of the slope are 100-foot cliffs towering over the east China sea.

Spearheading the final attack on the Yaeju-Dake plateau the 96th division smashed downhill from its dominating positions on the highest hill in the area. The path ahead was prepared by a blazing barrage of artillery and a series of incendiary bomb raids by marine planes. Burning "fire jelly" was splashed on Japanese-held ravines, caves and ridges.

A few localized counter-thrusts were crushed swiftly by advanced elements of the 96th and 7th army divisions and the 1st marines.

Sixty-four marine corsair bombers seared a cave-studded valley thought to be Japanese headquarters with 19,220 gallons of incendiary jelly and 465 rockets yesterday, then sprayed the entire area with machine-gun bullets.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, June 15 (UP)—Grain futures ruled steady to firm on the board of trade today with wheat relatively easier, counter to the trend. All deliveries of rye reached new season highs and July rye rose to the highest level since 1925.

Wheat rallied on the close to substantial gains, finishing the day up 3/4 to 2 cents; corn was up 1/4 to 1/2; oats up 1/4 to 1/2; rye up 1/4 to 1/2, and barley off 3/4 to 1 cent.

Nearly rye contracts displayed the most strength reflecting distiller demand and the tight statistical supply situation.

Wheat sagged from early highs under hedge selling. While the new crop is large, doubt existed in the trade as to how fast grain would move, in view of the current car shortage situation.

COLLEGE PREXY QUITS

NEWBERG, Ore., June 15 (UP)—The board of managers of Pacific college of Newberg today announced the resignation of President Emmett W. Gulley had been accepted "with regret."

Gulley said he lacked full support from a group of leaders of the Oregon yearly meeting of the Friends church, denominational backers of the school.

Rail Shares Lead Stock Price Gains

NEW YORK, June 15 (UP)—Railroad shares, with gains ranging to two points and the average at an eight-year high, led the stock market higher in a moderately active session today.

The railroad and utility groups vied with each other for leadership in volume. Heaviest trading was in the low-priced utility shares, notably Commonwealth and Southern, United Corporation, and National Power.

Active rails had gains running to 2 1/2 points in North Western. Armour and Wilson were heavily traded, each with a new high. Armour preferred ran up more than five points. Steels and the leading motors were firm.

PORTLAND DAIRY

PORTLAND, June 15 (UP)—Prices were unchanged on the Portland dairy market today as eggs and live poultry continued very scarce and butter stocks piled up.
