gram was climaxed by a realistic
assault on enemy pillboxes, with
the infantry combat unit going
into action with its rifles, auto-
matic rifles, machine guns, mor-
tars, bazookas and flame throw-
ers.

The explosions of "artillery"
shells made the demonstration
more realistic, and the entire
program was made much more
understandable and interesting
by the running comment of Lt.
George Mooney over a public
address system.

During an intermission, W. C.
Perkins, chairman of the county
war finance committee, intro-
duced a number of leaders of the
women's division and praised
their work in the current bond
selling campaign.

Miss Mabel Morton, chairman
of the county women's division
and Mrs. Ann Decker, city chair-
man, introduced several of the
leading workers, including Mrs.
Hanford Reed of Elgin and Mrs.
Thelma Freisinger, whose record
of 225 individual bond sales ag-
gregating \$189,000 is the highest
in the state.

H. E. Dixon praised the work
of the infantrymen in the field
and urged that everyone buy
more bonds to back them up.

any frustrated paperhanger any-
where who may be dreaming of
world domination."

Nimitz, Halsey Favor Plan

Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz
said peacetime conscription is
"imperative" if the U. S. would
avoid the risk of having its coast-
al cities devastated like Berlin,
Tokyo, Warsaw and Amsterdam.

He said the airplane and rocket
had made continental United
States "vulnerable to direct as-
sault," adding:

"I believe we have fought the
last war in which our homeland
will be spared the violence of
our enemies."

Joining in the plea for post-
war compulsory military training
of American youth was Adm-
iral William F. "Bill" Halsey.

Bodies of Missing

Airmen Recovered

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex., June 16
(UP)—Navy divers today re-
covered the bodies of five of sev-
en airmen missing and presumed
dead after their navy patrol
bomber struck a channel marker
and plunged into Corpus
Christi bay.

The divers continued their
search for the two bodies still
missing.

The seven men were part of
a crew of 16 aboard the seaplane
when it crashed into the bay dur-
ing a landing before dawn Fri-
day, the navy said.

Few Prisoners of

Japs Liberated

MANILA, June 16 (UP)—Only
147 of more than 16,000 Ameri-
can prisoners of war taken on
Baragan and Corregidor have been
liberated, it was announced to-
day.

Of those originally captured
3,260 have been reported casual-
ly dead. Most of the remainder
are in prison camps in Japan,
China and Formosa.

A 9 to 8 victory at Boston
gave them the lead for a while
yesterday, and though the Bucs
regained it later with a 5 to 2
night victory over the Cardin-
als, it didn't matter too much
to Brooklyners because their
team had been in first, hadn't
it?

Goodwin Rosen's triple and
Howie Schultz' double featured
a three-run eighth inning that
clinched the Dodgers' seventh
straight victory. They made 16
hits, Luis Olmo getting a homer.
With the score tied, 3-all in the
third, rain halted the second
game.

Nick Strincevich spotted the
Cards two first inning runs at
Pittsburgh, then held them score-
less and the Bucs tied the count
on Charley Barrett in the second.

Yankees Down Phillies

Indicating there is nothing
wrong with any club a series
with the Phils won't cure, the
Giants broke a six-game losing
streak with a 7 to 5 victory. Leon
"Jed" hadway, replacing Joe Med-
wick, drove in three runs with
both major leagues with a mark
of .390, the weekly averages
showed today.

Tony Cuccinello of the Chicago
White Sox, also crossing up the
experts, remained in front in the
American league, but he had to
share the lead at 344 with Nick
Etten of the New York Yankees.

Holmes, in addition to leading
