Thousands Line Capital's Streets To Welcome 'Ike'

from congress and the government's highest dignitaries, the presentation by President Truman of his third distinguished service medal, a White House dinner.
But when he faced the congress, General of the Army Eisenhower, the hero of as great a military campaign as was ever fought, had nothing to say about himself except:
"I am summoned before you as the representative—the commander—of those 3,000,000 American men and women to whom you desire to pay America's tribute for military victory.
"In humble realization that they, who earned your commendation, should properly be here to receive it, I am nevertheless proud and honored to serve as your agent in conveying it to them."
Renews Victory Pledge
Speaking for those millions, General Ike said there was "not the slightest doubt that our people's spirit of determination, which has buoyed us up and driven us forward in Europe, will continue to fire this nation through the ordeals of the battle yet to come."
"In this spirit," he said, "we renew our pledge of service to our commander-in-chief, President Truman, under whose strong leadership we know that final victory is certain."
And he paid a special tribute to the late Franklin D. Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill—"These two God-given men."
"To those two of us recognize our lasting obligation," he said.
It was "Eisenhower Day" for everybody from President Truman down, and—in the words of Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson—it was "a proud day for America."
General Ike flew home with 45 other returning warriors in four-engine skystrimmers which were escorted on the last 50 miles of their trip to the national airport by a roaring armada of bombers and fighters.
But all he could say when he stepped on his home soil for the first time in a year and a half was, "Oh, God, it's swell to be back."
For long seconds after he stepped from his plane, following a 21-hour flight from Paris, General Ike held his wife in his arms and gave her a kiss that she should remember.
Then he gave himself up to the crowds of hero-worshippers who had been gathering along Constitution and Pennsylvania avenues for hours.

Miners' Travel Time Rehearing Denied

WASHINGTON, June 18 (UP)—The supreme court today refused to reconsider its recent ruling that soft coal miners must be paid for underground travel time.
The court was asked to rehear the case by the Jewell Ridge coal corp., operator of two bituminous mines in Virginia.

BRITISH SHIP LOSS TOLD

LONDON, June 18 (UP)—The Admiralty announced tonight that Britain lost 263 minesweepers sunk and 74 badly damaged out of 1,533 in operation during the war. It said British sweepers accounted for 20,429 mines during the war.

Markets

Rails Lift Stocks To 8-Year Peak

NEW YORK, June 18 (UP)—Strength in railroad issues today lifted the general stock market average to a new high since August 14, 1937, despite a laggard industrial group.
Railroad shares registered gains running to more than 3 points. Utility issues firmed to a new high since March 20, 1937. Aircrafts were strong at new highs. Numerous special issues moved ahead. Meanwhile the leading steels and motors, some of the oils, and chemicals suffered declines running to a point in allied chemical.
Greatest volume centered on rails with Missouri-Kansas-Texas, New York Central, and Erie neck and neck for top place. The first gained 3 points while its preferred rose more than 3. Gains of 2 to more than 3 points were noted in several other issues.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, June 18 (UP)—Distiller demand for cash rye prompted heavy covering in the futures pit lifting all rye deliveries to new season highs on the board of trade today July rye at one point climbed almost 4 1/2 cents a bushel to a new 20-year peak. December and May corn also established seasonal records. Other grains held steady to firm.
Rye finished the day up 2 1/2 to 4 1/4 cents a bushel; wheat was up 1 cent to 1 3/4; corn unchanged to up 1/4; oats up 1/2 to 1 1/4, and barley up 1 1/2 to 5 cents.
Trading held to comparatively light volume with the undertone nervous in rye. In addition to the distiller outlet for cash rye, new sales of the spot article to Belgium were reported but unconfirmed.
