## Three Qualify For National PGA Meet

PORTLAND, June 19 (UP)—Stroking through 36 holes of golf at the Portland golf club yesterday with a four-under-par 140, Joe Mezel, Portland golfer, had the distinction today of topping all northwest qualifiers for the National PGA meet and capturing the Northwest Professional Golf association's 1945 crown.

Three other golfers qualified for the national match at Toledo, O., starting July 8. Neil Christian, former Portlander now in Spokane, had a 144 for second place, and Larry Lamberger, Portland golf club pro, carded a 146 for third. Chuck Congdon, Tacoma, automatically qualified on the strength of reaching the semi-finals of the national meet last year.

The war department announced today the award of the legion of merit to Col. Paul R. The award will be presented to Col. Goode at his home in Corvallis, where he is recuperating from the imprisonment.

As senior officer in the prison camp, he succeeded in making the Germans live up to the agreements in the Geneva pact of 1929. Col. Goode has been in service since his graduation from West Point academy in 1917.

## Triple Murder and Suicide Indicated

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 19 (UP)—Sheriff W. M. Harper of Benton county today announced finding the bodies of Clifford J. Allen, 34, his wife, Loretta, 29, and their two young sons in their isolated home at Summit.

Sheriff Harper said first indications were that Allen had shot and killed his wife and two sons, then committed suicide with a .30 caliber rifle. The boys were Larry, 6 and Dickie, 4 months.

## Gambling Declared Baker "Necessity"

PORTLAND, Ore., June 19 (UP)—A retail beer license for the Pastime cigar store of Baker, Ore., was denied today by the state liquor commission after Blaine Hallock, attorney, pleaded for a license on the ground that gambling is a "definite necessity" in Baker to take care of the employees of the mines and mills who drift into the city on Saturday night.

The commission had previously denied a license to the cigar store motivated by the fact there was gambling in the establishment.

Hallock contended that previous board action was too severe in face of the "need for gambling in Baker."

## Army Keeps Trucks Moving In Chicago

CHICAGO, June 19 (UP)—Approximately 15,000 soldiers were assembled in the Chicago area today under orders to keep trucks carrying war and civilian goods moving despite a strike by two unions in defiance of government orders.

The steel-helmeted soldiers consisted of truck drivers and military policemen who escorted trucks driven by civilian and soldier drivers.

It was estimated that 10,000 drivers remained away from their jobs. The drivers on strike are affiliated with the Chicago independent truck drivers union, with 6,500 members, and the brotherhood of international teamsters, with 8,000 members.

## Probe of Iron Sale To Japan Sought

WASHINGTON, June 19 (UP)—Rep. J. Parnell Thomas, R. N. J., introduced a resolution today to set up a special 7-man house committee to investigate scrap iron shipments to Japan in the 10 years prior to Pearl Harbor.

"It is that same scrap iron which today is killing and wounding thousands of our boys in the Pacific theater of war," Thomas said.

"If Japan had been unable to purchase huge stock piles of scrap iron from us, there probably would not have been a Pearl Harbor. The American people should be taken behind the scenes and acquainted with these facts."

FIRE LOOKOUTS PLANNED  
EUGENE, Ore., June 19 (UP)—Five new lookout towers will be placed in the Willamette national forest this summer to guard against fire hazards, J. R. Bruckart, forester, disclosed today.

## Conservative Beats Mackenzie King

OTTAWA, June 19 (UP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King lost his parliamentary seat today after the final tabulation of the soldier vote in the recent Canadian elections.

King lost his Prince Albert riding to E. L. Bowerman, cooperative conservative candidate, by 129 votes.

Leaders of King's liberal party said he probably will run again for the east Ottawa seat won by Liberal Jean Richard, who would step aside.

They said that the soldier vote made no other changes in the overall results of the national election last June 11.

The liberals claimed that King's government will control at least 130 seats when Canada's 20th parliament convenes. The government needs 123 for a bare majority.

## Medford Will Have Civilian Air Strip

MEDFORD, Ore., June 19 (UP)—The city of Medford held permission today from the civil aeronautic authority for the building and operation of an air strip for civilian fliers.

City Superintendent Frank Rogers said work on the strip will start as soon as manpower and equipment are available.
