

Anti-Strike Law Abolition Urged By Sen. Morse

WASHINGTON, June 21 (UP)—Sen. Wayne C. Morse, R., Ore., urged at a war labor board hearing that labor and management "join forces to abolish the Smith-Connally anti-strike law at the earliest possible date."

Morse said he had so advised the Los Angeles metal trades council (AFL), which has taken a vote to strike if the WLB denies its demand for 11.6 per cent wage increase for ship repair workers. The higher wage for repair work now prevails in San Francisco, Portland and Seattle areas.

"The Smith-Connally act is so unsound and inimical to the best interests of labor and industry that I think the representatives of labor and management should join forces to abolish it at the earliest possible date," Morse said.

Morse urged the WLB to extend the 11.6 differential to the Los Angeles area yards. He accused the federal agencies of "feeding ship repair work into Los Angeles out of all proportion to that fed into other ports."

"If we continue to let the government build up ship repair work in Los Angeles because of lower wage rates, the government will be a party to a discrimination that cannot be justified," Morse said. "We highly disapprove of the position the procurement agencies have taken."

Acting as spokesman for all of the Pacific coast senate delegation, Morse said he was not pleading a labor case but one of public interest. A former WLB public member, Morse said that it was the first time he had appeared before the board in the role of pleader.

Magnuson made the announcement after receiving assurance from Rear Admiral E. W. Mills, assistant chief of the bureau of ships. Mills advised him that ship repair work is expected to continue at a high level for the duration and for many months thereafter, subject only to temporary fluctuations.

The Civil air patrol in the La Grande area has been presented with a United States flag, by Col. Leo Devaney of the CAP and the Oregon state board of aeronautics.

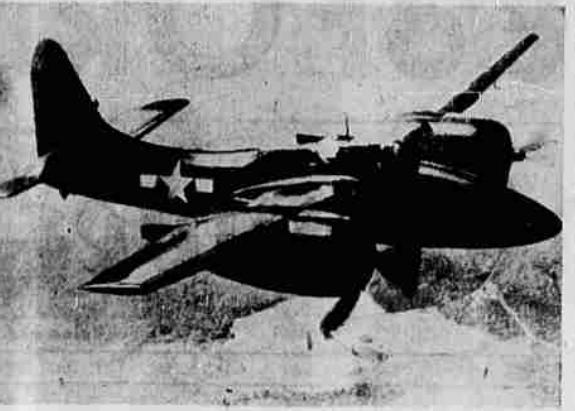

SALEM, Ore., June 21 (UP)—City and county officials will be invited to air their views on Oregon's tax problems at the next meeting of the newly created tax study committee, it was decided at the initial meeting of the group here yesterday.
