Fisticuffs Result As Sox Defeat Browns

NEW YORK, June 21 (UP)—The St. Louis Browns, lacking punch at the plate as usual, apparently tried to make up for it by throwing plenty of them in the Chicago White Sox dugout, giving new baseball commissioner, Sen. Alben B. (Happy) Chandler, one of his first major headaches today.

The short-tempered Browns have "dropped 14 of the last 23 games, tumbling into sixth place last night with their latest defeat, 4 to 1, by the White Sox, during which the fracas took place. All of which backs the belief of some experts who sized up the Browns as "one-year-wonders" about to round out a double play of "rags-to-riches-to-rags."

Relief pitcher George Caster, victim with starter Al Hollingsworth of a four-run outburst in the eighth inning which cost the Browns the game, was yanked by Manager Luke Sewell.

Caster starts Rumpus

Caster threw the ball toward the White Sox dugout in disgust. Manager Jimmy Dykes of the Sox protested to Umpire Art Passarella, and while the argument grew white hot, the Browns stormed the Chicago bench.

Carl Scheel, ex-marine and batting practice pitcher for the White Sox, was singled out and reportedly suffered a terrific punishment. The Browns complained he was guilty of "uncouth jockeying," almost precisely the same charge which was leveled by the Washington Senators against the Browns in baseball's number one feud of 1944.

Dodgers Win Two

The leading Dodgers in the National and the Tigers in the American stretched their margins with impressive wins. The Dodgers, whose success has to be discounted since they are playing the last place Phils at Philadelphia, won a twin bill, 4 to 2 and 8 to 1.

Lefty Hal Newhouser made his 10th victory a five-hit shut-out over the visiting Indians as the Tigers won 5 to 0, and increased their American league lead to two and a half games.

The Cubs, latest "good thing" in the National, used Claude Passeau's relief pitching and timely hitting to waylay the Pirates, 5 to 3. Babe Dahlgren of the Cubs and Phil Cavaretta of the Cubs hit homers.

The Braves dropped the fading Giants into fifth place by winning, 15 to 10, in a bat battle at New York.

Mickey Haefner of the Senators had only one bad inning, the

sixth, in which the visiting Athletics made all their runs, as he won a six-hit game, 7 to 5.

New York at Boston was rained out in the American and St. Louis and Cincinnati were not scheduled in the National.

Coasting Along

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21 (UP)—There will be no invasion of the Pacific coast league territory by the American or National leagues—now or ever.

That's the statement of President Clarence (Pants) Rowland, major league baseball on the Pacific coast," Rowland said. "But we never will bargain away one city or two to the major leagues.

"Rather, when major league baseball comes to the west, it will be when the Pacific coast league is given major league status."

Rowland asserted there is no chance for such a move now or even in the immediate future—but that in the years ahead when the west coast becomes as populous as the east, there will be major league baseball in all eight cities in the loop.

Recently various easterners have pointed out that with air travel, the east coast teams could be moved to Los Angeles or San Francisco with no more elapsed time than the current train ride between eastern major league cities.

Rowland, here on an inspection swing around the league, said coast loop attendance is up approximately 175,000 compared with the record-breaking 1944 season. San Francisco and San Diego are the two leading attendance gainers.

The league chief was in Oakland last week and watched the Aacorns put 47,000 fans through the turnstiles in their six days of play against the San Francisco Seals.

"That kind of attendance," he declared, "distinctly is worthy of major league baseball."

Home Building, Repair Delayed By Lumber Scarcity

Continued delay in remodeling and new construction otherwise permitted by the relaxing of war production board controls is predicted by L. M. Ghan, manager of the Home Lumber and Coal company, due to the continuing scarcity of lumber and certain other building materials.

"Lumber still is a vital war material," he said, "and great quantities are required for construction and for boxing and crating war supplies for the Pacific. The situation is aggravated because of manpower and equipment shortages which curtail lumber production, and it is easy to see that while the war production board wishes to ease controls on civilian construction as quickly as possible, there still will be a period of time before the industry will be in position to help the public take advantage of the board's action."

"Within these limits, the industry is prepared to do everything it can to help its customers accomplish needed repair and maintenance work. The relaxation in construction control order L-41 increases the amount a person can spend on home construction, including repair, maintenance, or remodeling, from \$200 to \$1,000, both for farm houses and urban dwellings. It steps up the amount from \$1,000 to \$5,000 on commercial stores, shops and certain service establishments, and from \$5,000 to \$25,000 for industrial buildings.

"At the same time, the war production board has found it necessary to continue its tight control on lumber distribution through its control order L-335, which permits only a very small amount of available lumber in dealers' inventories to be sold to home owners for maintenance, repair or remodeling."
