

**More Money Sought For Army Engineers**

WASHINGTON, June 25 (UP)—The house appropriations committee recommended today that the war department be given an additional \$15,400,000 for flood control and rivers and harbors work during the 1946 fiscal year. No reductions were made in the requests approved by the budget bureau. The total included \$4,000,000 for advance planning for 34 authorized projects, \$2,504,000 for construction of eight rivers and harbors projects and \$8,900,000 for construction of six flood control projects.

**Pulp Worker Wage Case Goes to WLB**

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25 (UP)—Officials of the AFL said today wage demands of 13,000 workers in 32 Pacific coast pulp and paper mills have been certified to the war labor board. Two unions are asking a 20 per cent wage increase to offset a rollback from a 48 to a 40-hour week; an increase in night differential pay from 2½ cents an hour to 4 cents for swing and 6 cents for graveyard; and six holidays with pay.
