Upward Movement Marks Stock Deals

NEW YORK, June 25 (UP)—The stock market advanced on a broad front today to the highest general level since April 21, 1937. Trading was active and sales topped the million-share level for the 21st consecutive full session.

Railroad shares led the rise in forenoon trading but after midday railway equipments, airline shares, aircraft and liquors joined the advance. Automotive equipments met selective buying. Steels, tire shares, amusements, selected textiles and communications were higher.

Economic Force Is Used to Balk Nazi Revival of Power

WASHINGTON, June 25 (UP)—The United Nations are now engaged in a ruthless campaign to stamp out economic spearheads in neutral European and Latin-American countries and thus defeat the Nazi plan for a return to power via stepping stones in other nations, a senate committee was told today.

Assistant Secretary of State William L. Clayton gave a senate military affairs subcommittee detailed evidence of German plans to conduct economic infiltration of other nations during the period of allied occupation of their homeland.

And he told how this country, along with other nations, is even now conducting a campaign of economic warfare against that potent Nazi threat.

In Latin-America, for instance, Clayton said the United States has "eliminated" or is "in the process of eliminating" 654 out of 846 known "spearheads of axis economic penetration."

In neutral European countries he said the allies used this country's economic position to thwart Nazi plans to gain post-war footholds. Among accomplishments he listed a Swiss law blocking German accounts and providing a census of German property; a Spanish decree freezing control over assets of citizens of axis or axis-dominated countries; a similar decree in Portugal and "satisfactory progress" for like action in Sweden.

The United States is convinced that German cartels played a great part in the rearmament of Germany after the last war, and Clayton told the committee first steps already have been taken toward the dissolution of German international combines, and seize German patents and investments.

He was accompanied on the return trip by Mrs. Graham, who will remain there while his ship is docked.

Ensign Graham, co-owner of the Leisman drug store, serves as a deck officer in the navy.

First Lieutenant Worth A. Epling, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Epling, Adams Ave., La Grande, Oregon arrived at the Presque Isle, Maine army air field last week having flown the North Atlantic division's famed Snowball route from Paris to Presque Isle, Maine.

While in the ETO Lt. Epling served in air corps ordnance and wears the silver star, American defense ribbon, Asiatic-Pacific theater ribbon. He also has two commendations — one from Admiral Nimitz and the other from General Emmons.

Ensign Ronald Mohr, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Mohr, is in La Grande on leave from Norfolk, Va., until July 1, when he will report in San Francisco. After a month there he will go to Seattle for duty aboard a destroyer to serve as a torpedo officer.

Cpl. Helen Pickens, 1221 X avenue, is to graduate this week from a six-week course in statistical control procedure at the AAF center in Orlando, Florida, and will be assigned to duty at one of the various statistical control units scattered throughout the country.

Her husband, Pfc. Louis Pickens is stationed at Hill Field, Ogden, and a brother, Capt. Walter Buckley is with the 186th in.

commission to demand stricter enforcement of game laws and asking justice of the peace in the area to make stiffer fines and punishment for game law violations was passed.

A resolution asking that, if the game farm is moved from its present place in Pendleton, because of unsatisfactory conditions, it be relocated in the district received full approval.

The game commission was asked to prepare and send to all member clubs instructions on the building of stockades for the protection of haystacks from elk.

Cooper, Milton-Freewater, Harold Otto; North Powder, Bryan Gorham; Joseph, Max Wilson; and the officers, R. J. Green and John H. Newman, La Grande, and Vernon Kennedy, Pendleton. Baker and some other communities were unable to send representatives, but sent their recommendations in letter form.

R. D. McClellan, member of the state game commission from eastern Oregon, attended the session, giving his counsel as to group policy in many matters. He emphasized the importance of the organization and its work and congratulated the members on their give and take attitude in regard to desires of the various areas in the council.
