Few Drops of Solvent Make Nail Polish Smooth as Liquid Silk

Does polish peel off like rubber or buckle on slicked-up nails? Chances are you're guilty of what a lot of women confess to, and what the nail-polish people groaningly call a crime, and that is thinning out thickened polish with a polish remover.

This combination, it seems, produces a mixture of incompatible ingredients which absolutely refuse to work together. Polish is specifically made to adhere to nails. Remover, given just the opposite job to do, pries off polish at the touch of a cotton-soaked swab.

So, stop mixing the two together. When polish gets gummy, the trick of making it flow is to shake or stir the bottle like mad. If this agitation doesn't loosen it up, use a solvent—specially prepared thinner—a few
