

# Senators Nip Tiger Hold on League Lead

NEW YORK, June 28 (UP)—Pitiful Emil (Dutch) Leonard moved to the top of the list today as Detroit Tiger enemy number one. As if it weren't enough to beat them out of a pennant on the last day of the season, the wild Belgian knuckle baller for the Washington Senators was back again, doing his best to knock them out of first place this year.

His best was good enough for a four-hit, 3 to 1 Senator victory in the Detroit twilight. Then when the Yankees beat the Browns at St. Louis later in the evening, the Tigers had to share first place with the men of Joe McCarthy.

Paul (Dixie) Trout, the same pitcher he beat in that 1944 finale that gave the Browns the pennant, got the only hit that kept a winner. Trout's pitching was another story. Before going out in the sixth, he gave up eight hits to lose his eighth game.

**Yanks Crown Browns**

The Yankees won their seventh straight and their second in a row from the Browns at St. Louis, 7 to 2. Held hitless by Jack Kramer for five innings, they scored twice in the seventh and five times in the ninth to give Floyd Bennett his seventh win.

The Indians hammered Russ Christopher of Philadelphia for his first loss in six games and his third against 11 victories, winning 5 to 2 at Cleveland. He was tagged for 14 hits.

Dolph Camilli, making his first appearance since leaving the coast league as manager at Oakland, pinch-hit in the ninth to highlight a three-run rally which gave the Red Sox an 11 to 9 win at Chicago.

**Dodgers Build Lead**

The Dodgers increased their National league lead to four games, beating Chicago at Brooklyn, 6 to 5, when Luis Ojeda atoned for missing a pop-fly by singing home the winning run in the ninth.

The Giants came out of their slump and the Pirates prolonged theirs at New York. A double victory, 10 to 4 and 3 to 2, moved the Giants into third place while the Pirates dropped to fifth. Van Lingle Mungo, given 17-hit support, won the opener for his eighth decision of the season, while Jack Brewer gave up only two homers to Lee Handley and Bill Selkeld in taking the second.

**Cards Trim Phillies**

Sylvester (Blix) Donnelly of the Cards pitched the finest game of his career, beating the Phils on one-hit, 6 to 0, after the quaking Quakers won the opener, 3 to 3. Donnelly, who has three victories, all of them shutouts, held the Phils hitless after Vance Dinges singled in the second. Ted Wilka was leading, 3 to 2, for the Cards in the eighth of the first game when he filled the bases and Vince Dimaggio greeted relief man Al Jurisich with his third grand slam homer of the year.

Despite Tommy Holmes, the Reds won two at Boston, 3 to 4, in 10 innings and, 3 to 2, with a three-run seventh inning in the nightcap. Holmes sent the first game into extra innings with a three-run homer, while his double gave the Braves both runs off Howard Fox in the nightcap.

# Sacs Take Beavers 6-1, as Rainiers Throttle Padres

Guy Fletcher's 12th victory of the season, fashioned behind a four-hit pitching performance that was good for a 6-to-1 Sacramento triumph over Portland, slugged the Beavers' Pacific coast league lead to an uneasy four games.

The other first division clubs came out of last night's battles with hard-fought, close victories. Carl Fischer scattered seven safeties as Seattle subdued San Diego, 4 to 1. San Francisco needed a rally, again touched off by James Sanders, to defeat Los Angeles, 3 to 2, with two important runs in the eighth inning. Len Gilmore had no trouble putting down the Hollywood Stars at Gilmore field, 5 to 2.

**Solons Win Handily**

The Solons were never headed after they scored five runs in a big second inning that settled the contest as far as Portland was concerned. They picked up the final tally in the third and with Fletcher eased up behind a 6-0 lead, the Beavers got their only run in the sixth on a single by Mel Nanes and a triple by Frank Demaree. Jess Landrum was the big hitter for the winners.

Sanders, who won Tuesday night's game for the Seals with a pinch hit, was called upon again last night as a pinch hitter and his single started San Francisco off to a two-run rally that won the game for them.

Fischer allowed the Padres only seven hits for the Rainiers' 4-1 triumph in the series opener between the two teams. San Diego took a temporary lead with their lone run in the fourth, but Seattle came back with single tallies in the fifth, seventh, eighth and ninth. Hal Patchett and George McDonald provided the heavy stick work for the winners.

## Georgian Threaten Segura Net Title

EVANSTON, Ill., June 28 (UP)—Francisco Pancho Segura, University of Miami tennis star from Ecuador, today made a major threat to an hope for a third consecutive national collegiate athletic association singles title. In sixth-seeded Howard McCall of Georgia Tech.

Going into the quarter finals, Segura was a top-seeded favorite of his coach's pool with his defeat yesterday of Delbert Russell, Wayne university, 6-9, 6-0. McCall pushed into competition with the flashy Billie Central American by stopping Jack Carroll of California Tech, 75, 6-1, in another third round singles match of the NCAA tournament.

Segura's protégé—classmate, Tom Burke, was defeated in a starting upset by Carroll Meador, Texas university, 7-5, 6-2. Burke teamed with Segura to help Michigan's Jack Hirsch and Gordon Naudie, 3-6, 6-2, 6-2.

## Chiang Says U. S. Help Too Skimpy

CHUNGKING, June 28 (UP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek in his first press conference since 1941, said today that the United States was not giving China enough economic help.

Chiang also said that a Chinese soldier, given training and equipment, can fight as well as any three soldiers from abroad, and that if it took foreign soldiers two years to defeat Japan, Chinese troops could do it in one year.

The Generalissimo complained that the United States has not paid enough attention to China's economic difficulties. He said that he enjoyed the military and diplomatic cooperation of Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, American commander in China, but he urged that more American economic experts be sent to China.
