### San Diego Padres Trim Rainiers in 14-inning Battle

San Diego nosed out a 2 to 1 win in a 14th inning opener of a Pacific coast league double-header with Seattle last night, and then dropped the six-inning nightcap 5 to 0.

In the other jousts Portland beat Sacramento 3 to 1, Oakland trounced Hollywood 13 to 2 and San Francisco came through in the last half of the ninth with two tallies to defeat Los Angeles 2 to 1.

Vallie Eaves pitched his 15th victory in the 14-inning stint of the Padres and the Rainiers, which was tied up when each team chalked up a run in the sixth.

**Pitchers Stage Duel**  
Jack Harshman singled in Dick Gyselman, former Seattle third baseman, who had opened the 14th inning with a single, for the deciding run to break up a pitching duel between Eaves and young Alex Palica. Eaves allowed eight hits and Palica nine.

Chuck Johnson, former San Diego pitcher, was on the mound in the nightcap, which was cut to six innings by a time limit. Chuck Aleno batted in two runs for Seattle and Hal Finley accounted for two more runs with a homer with a teammate on base.

Don Pulford held Sacramento to three hits as Portland took the game 3 to 1. The Beavers got three runs in the fifth, while Sacramento's only score was pitcher Jim McCarthy's homer in the third.

**Oaks Are Easy Victors**  
Floyd Strome pitched the Oakland A's to their third win in a row over the cellar-dwelling Hollywood Stars with the lopsided 13-2 victory. The Oaks collected two runs in the fourth on singles by Jake Caulfield and Vic Rossetti, five in the sixth on five singles, a walk and two Hollywood errors, and six in the eighth on Tom Hafey's home run with none on base, four singles and three errors by the Stars.

Hollywood got one in the fifth with three walks and Manager Buck Fausett's single, and another in the sixth when Mel Steiner walked and Krause singled.

Pinehitting by Battle Malone (Bones) Sanders pulled the game out of the fire for the San Francisco Seals. Following his hit Joe Sprinz walked, Frank Seward sacrificed and Bernie Uhalt walked. Then Del Young was walked, forcing Sanders in, and Emil Maulho got an infield single for the clincher. The Angels scored when Jim Tyack crossed the plate on a triple steal in the fifth.

**Fishing Conditions Good in Oregon's Streams and Lakes**  
PORTLAND, June 29 (UP)—Fishing conditions in most sections of Oregon are good, Oregon state game commission reported today.

In Lane county, in the Willamette valley, however, only "fair" conditions prevail. Lincoln and Jackson counties also reported only fair conditions in some waters, and angling in Josephine, "poor."

Coos county striped bass are biting in the bay and inlets; being caught both by trolling and bank fishing. Cattishing in the Coquille, also fly fishing is good.

In eastern Oregon, upper King lake is good for trolling, and the river, good for flies and plugs. Odel and Crescent lakes in Klamath county are fair for trout, and fly fishing. The little Deschutes is good for bait fishing with worms and fly fishing in the evenings.

**Dodgers' Lead is Shaded**  
The Cubs trimmed Brooklyn's National lead to three games, beating the Dodgers, 11 to 8, Chicago got 15 hits to cushion ineffective pitching. Harry (Peanuts) Lowrey for Chicago and Goodwin Rosen for Brooklyn hit homers.

The Braves, up to their specialty of winning games in the clutch, beat the Reds at Boston, 7 to 6, on Chuck Workman's two-run home in the ninth. Steve Measter gave the Reds an early lead with a homer and pitcher Jim Tobin countered with a two-run circuit clout for Boston. League leading hitter Tommy Holmes delivered safely in his 24th straight game.

The Cards batted around in the fourth to score five runs, enough to beat the Phils at Philadelphia, 6 to 1. Rookie Ken Burkhardt won his eighth game to take the lead among Cardinal pitchers.

Nick Strincovich won his seventh game for Pittsburgh, beating the Giants, 3 to 1, at New York. The Pirates made 12 hits off Harry Feldman, but seldom were able to launch them.

The Boston at Chicago game in the American was rained out.

### Nelson, McSpaden Golf Favorites

CHICAGO, June 29 (UP)—It was the field against Byron Nelson again today as 42 of the nation's top golfers teed off in the opening round of the \$10,000 victory national open at Calumet country club.

Nelson, golfdom's leading money maker who has won 10 of the last 16 major tournaments, feared no man as much as he feared the tricky greens on the 6,657-yard Calumet course.

"I just can't read those greens," he said, "and unless I start getting better I might as well go home and read how McSpaden does it."

Jug McSpaden, the Sanford, Me., putting artist and Nelson's most persistent rival, is defending champion in the open and the one entry given a good chance to beat Nelson. During the preliminary tournaments of the victory nation, he made a 67, five under par, to show his fondness for the course.

Segura, Ecuadorian star from the University of Miami, advanced into the semi-finals by defeating Howie McCall, Georgia Tech, seeded sixth, yesterday. The score was 6-2, 6-3.

### Girls' Team Makes Formidable Record

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29 (UP)—One of the most remarkable records in sports history is being compiled by the Bay Meadows girls' softball team — formerly the world's champion Alemeda club.

The club recently annexed its 97th consecutive victory by defeating the current Portland world champions.

And the most remarkable thing about the victory was the fact that it was the 97th straight triumph, too, for "Willie" Turner, the girls' ace moundsman, who has not been struck upon this season.

### Welter Champ To Attempt Comeback

NEW YORK, June 29 (UP)—Welterweight champion Freddie Cochrane will climb into the white patch of ring light at Madison Square Garden tonight hoping to prove that: (1) he is not a "cheese chump," and (2) veteran performers can return to big-time competition successfully after a long term of military service.

Cochrane, who spent three and a half years in the navy, is squaring off against young Rocky Graziano of New York for a 10-round non-title bout. It will be the champ's first important fight in nearly three years.

Despite red-headed Cochrane's hopes, young Graziano is favored at 12-5 to spill the titleholder's return.

### Musical Comedy is Liberty Attraction

Carmen Miranda, Vivian Blaine and Phil Silvers, appear in leading roles of "Something for the Boys," which has as the chief figure in the supporting cast Michael O'Shea, Perry Como, and Shiela Ryan.

The film is a romantic comedy musical, to which spectator interest is enhanced by color photography. The story revolved around the efforts of three cousins to do "something for the boys" at an army camp near their plantation.

### Newhouser Bowls Over Senators 5-2

NEW YORK, June 29 (UP)—Restoring Detroit's one-game lead over the Yankees yesterday, Hal Newhouser bat the Senators, 5 to 2, on six hits for his seventh straight win.

That gave the lanky lefty a 12 and 4 record for the season, putting him two games ahead of his 1944 pace and surpassing every other American league pitcher for this stage of the race since Bobby Feller was on the firing line at Cleveland in 1941. Feller, going at a phenomenal pace early that year, had a 16-3 mark, but faded in the late season and wound up with a 25-13 record.

Beating Washington's ace, Roger Wolff, was simplified when Eddie Mayo contributed a first inning homer. Newhouser struck out six to run his league-leading total to 96. His only bad inning was the fifth when the Senators made both of their runs, one of them on Harland Clift's homer.

A six-run fifth inning gave the Browns margin for a 9 to 4 victory over the Yankees at St. Louis, ending their five-game losing streak and snapping New York's winning streak at seven. Vernon Stephens got his 13th homer for the Browns as Sig Jakucki marked up his seventh triumph.

Frankie Hayes, who did little besides make an appearance, tied the major league durability record for catchers at Cleveland, working his 217th straight game as Jim Bagby shut out the Athletics, 11 to 0. Hayes, obtained last month from the A's, equalled the mark of Cincinnati's Ray Mueller, now in the service. The Indians made 16 hits, Jeff Heath leading the way with three, including a homer, to drive in three runs. Bagby, giving up six hits, won his second game against eight defeats.
