Trading Falls Off Sharply in Stocks

NEW YORK, July 3 (UP) — Trading fell off sharply on the stock market today in advance of the Independence day holiday. Prices made an irregular advance.

The technical recovery in progress yesterday went ahead in many sections of the list. Enough industrial issues declined to bring a small net loss in that average and a few special issues had wide declines, ranging to 4 points in Eastman Kodak preferred.

Private Miller entered the service in March, 1943, and was sent overseas in March, 1944. In March of this year, a communication was received bearing the heading "With the 24th (victory) division in the Philippines" and reading as follows:

"Private First Class Jacob Miller... will never forget the grim experience of a two-week battle out of which his company came back only 60 strong but left behind them the corpses of 500 Japs.

"From atop a strategic ridge Jap mortars and machine guns poured murderous fire on the forward-slugging Americans below...

"At night Miller's foxhole was half filled with water and mud. Rations and ammunition had to be carried by hand over two miles of sniper-infested ground. There was no hot food, for even the mess sergeant was in a front line foxhole killing Japs.

"Ironically enough, Private Miller came through this experience unscathed by Jap fire. As yet no details of his death have been received.

A memorial service was held Friday in Christ Lutheran church in Walla Walla.

Practically the entire senate, the cabinet, many members of the house, the state department staff and the White House staff packed President Truman's office.

Word has been received by Mrs. John Olson, 1706 Spruce street, that her brother, Pfc. Jacob Miller, had died of wounds received on Mindanao island in the Philippines June 5. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Miller, Milton, and has three brothers in the army and two in the navy.

Miller was born July 12, 1912, in Walla Walla, and Sept. 13, 1941, married Ila Jean Demaris, daughter of Mrs. Grace Demaris, Milton.

Besides his wife and parents he leaves nine brothers and sisters; Al, Katherine, Carl, John, William, Herman, Bertha, Albert and George. Of these Carl, John, William, Herman and George are in the armed forces.

WASHINGTON, July 3 (UP)—James F. Byrnes took the oath as secretary of state today and promised to uphold "the basic principles of our foreign policy."

John Golden, 56, Dies in Portland; Ill Eight Months

John J. Golden, 56, formerly of La Grande, died Monday in Portland, after eight months of illness.

He was born Sept. 6, 1888, near La Grande. His parents were Mattie H. and Charles E. Golden, early pioneers to Union county. He lived here until 25 years ago, when he moved to Portland.

Surviving him are his wife, Margaret, a son, Virgil, now with the army in Italy, a brother, Arthur of Medford, and four sisters, Mrs. Fred Yesko and Mrs. Archie Conley, both of La Grande, Mrs. Rachel Caviness, Astoria, and Mrs. Leroy Hull, Glens Ferry, Ida.

Burial will be at 2 p.m. Friday at the Summerville cemetery.

'Leftist' To Face Fight on Committee

WASHINGTON, July 3 (UP)—Southern opposition was developing today against any attempt by administration forces to name Rep. Henry M. Jackson, D. Wash., to succeed Rep. Edward J. Hart, D. N. J., as chairman of the house un-American activities committee. Some southerners said Jackson is entirely too "left" in his political thinking. Jackson, not at present a committee member, declined to comment.

Acting chairman John E. Rankin, D. Miss., who turned down the un-American committee chairmanship in order to keep his post as head of the powerful house veterans committee, took the news of the Jackson offer coolly.

"I should think they'd want someone a little more sympathetic to the committee," he said. He told reporters he intends to back a candidate himself but couldn't say exactly who it will be.

The boy fell from a hay rack, and landed on a hay fork, one prong of the implement piercing his body under his left arm and extending through the flesh to come out over his shoulder blade.

Fortunately, no arteries or veins were hit and after a few days observation at the hospital he will be allowed to go home.

Woman Slays Man For 'Treatment'

TACOMA, Wash., July 3 (UP)—Police today are holding Blanche Patton, 60, partially paralyzed patient of a nursing home. She admitted killing a 60-year-old ward-man with a bread knife.

Mrs. Patton told police she had tried to kill Fred Stone several days ago, when he failed to return \$80 she had loaned him to make a down payment on a car. She gashed Stone's chin with a knife.

"I guess the knife was too small then," she explained.

Determined her next attempt should be successful, Mrs. Patton said she picked out a large bread knife last night, and walked into a darkened room where Stone lay on the bed. She said she sat and talked with him for a few minutes before she pushed the knife through his throat, and walked out of the room.
