Average Payrolls In State Increase

SALEM, July 5 (UP) — Average payrolls of industries not connected with the war effort are gradually increasing, a report from the state unemployment compensation commission indicated today.

First quarter payrolls for all industries covered by the commission increased 2.1 percent over 1944, the report showed, while average covered employment was down 5.8 percent.

Lumbering showed the largest decline in payrolls, dropping 14.8 percent, followed by construction and shipyards, which dropped 12.3 and 4.7 percent respectively, reflecting completion of several wartime projects and contracts.

Wholesale and retail concerns, however, increased their payrolls by \$3,672,000 during the first quarter as compared to the same period last year.

Total employment in March was 286,343.

Shortcake shorts

FRUIT OR BERRY SHORTCAKE
3 cups all-purpose flour
4 tps. baking powder
2 tps. sugar
1 tsp. salt
1/2 cup shortening
1 egg
1 cup milk
4 cups sweetened fresh fruit or berries

Sift and measure flour, sift again with baking powder, sugar, and salt. Cut in shortening until mixture is very fine. Beat egg; combine with milk; then stir into flour mixture. Knead gently; roll out about 1/4 inch thick.

FAMILY SHORTCAKE
Divide dough in half; pat gently into two 8-inch cake pans. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) about 20 minutes. Split while warm, fill with sweetened fruit or berries. Serve with top milk or whipped evaporated milk or coffee cream.

HOW TO WHIP EVAPORATED MILK OR COFFEE CREAM
Pour evaporated milk or cream into freezing tray of refrigerator. Chill until ice crystals start to form around the edge. Place in chilled bowl and beat vigorously with rotary beater until thickened and fairly stiff. Flavor with a few drops of vanilla.
