Proclamation — Whereas, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in the judgment of the State Forester, a menace to life and property due to conditions tending to cause or allow the rapid spread of fires which might occur because of the inaccessible character of such areas due to the lack of suitable roads, and Whereas, upon the showing of the State Forester it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following areas designated as: Area No. R-1—All National Forest in Oregon and adjacent areas protected by the United States Forest Service as follows: Adjacent to Umatilla National Forest: E 1/2 T. 6 N., R. 37 E., T. 6 N., R. 38 and 42 E., that part of T. 6 N., R. 43 E., west of Grande Ronde river, except Sections 13, 14, 23, 24, and 26; E 1/2 T. 5 N., R. 37 E., T. 5 N., R. 38 E., those parts of T. 5 N., R. 42 and 43 E., north and west of Grande Ronde river; T. 3 and 4 N., R. 37 E.; that part of T. 3 N., R. 36 E., outside Umatilla Indian Reservation; T. 1 S., R. 36 E.; Sections 25, 26, 27, 34, 35, and 36, T. 2 S., R. 32 E.; Sections 21 to 36 inclusive, T. 2 S., R. 33 E.; Section 36, T. 2 S., R. 35 E.; Sections 31 to 36 inclusive, T. 3 S., R. 29 E.; Sections 23, 24, 25, 26, and 31 to 36 inclusive, T. 3 S., R. 30 E.; S 1/2 T. 3 S., R. 30 1/2 E.; S 1/2 and NE 1/4 T. 3 S., R. 31 E.; T. 3 S., R. 32 E.; T. 4 S., R. 29 to 32 E., inclusive; that part of T. 5 S., R. 35 E., west of Grande Ronde river and Sheep creek; Sections 21, 22, 27, 34, and those parts of Sections 23, 26, and 35 west of Grande Ronde river; NE 1/4 SE 1/4, SW 1/4 NE 1/4 Section 8; SE 1/4 SE 1/4 Section 17; and that part of Section 16 west of Marley Creek road, T. 4 S., R. 35 E.; T. 6 S., R. 27 to 31 E., inclusive; and 33 to 35 E., inclusive; Sections 9, 10, 16, 21, and 28, T. 7 S., R. 27 E.; Section 1, T. 7 S., R. 28 E.; Section 6, and those parts of Sections 1 to 5 inclusive, north of North Fork John Day river, T. 7 S., R. 29 E.; that part of T. 7 S., R. 30 E., north of North Fork John Day river; Sections 13, 14, 23, and 24, T. 8 S., R. 25 E.; Section 36, T. 8 S., R. 26 E.; and Section 16, T. 8 S., R. 27 E. Now, Therefore, I, Howard C. Belton, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107.210, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 252, Oregon Laws, 1945, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above-described areas to be unlawful and do hereby close said areas and the same shall be subject to use only upon condition that entrants shall comply with all of the following requirements or conditions: 1. To refrain from smoking while traveling in such areas. 2. To secure a permit issued by the forester or a fire warden before building a campfire other than at improved, designated and posted campgrounds on such areas. 3. To have as a part of his or her equipment when using campfires, except when traveling as a pedestrian, and/or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires. This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 1st day of July, 1945, and shall remain in full force and effect until and including the 31st day of December, 1945. Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 28th day of June, 1945. Howard C. Belton, Governor. Attest: Robert S. Farrell, Jr., Secretary of State.

AT & T Strength Rallies Stock List

Revenue Carloading Increases in Week
WASHINGTON, July 6 (UP)—Loadings of revenue freight in the week ended June 30 totaled 883,741 cars, the most since the week ended April 28, the Association of American Railroads disclosed today.

This volume represents an increase of 17,299 cars over the preceding week but a decrease of 3,469 from the corresponding 1944 week.

Loadings for the year to date aggregated 21,381,945 cars compared with 21,285,302 in the corresponding 1944 period.
