AT & T Up Sharply  
To Lead Markets

NEW YORK, July 9 (UP) — American Telephone & Telegraph capital shares and debentures rose sharply to further new highs today and led the stock and bond markets higher in light turnover.

A. T. & T. stock ran up more than 5 points to a new high since 1937 while among listed bonds the degenerate 3s of 1956 had a similar gain to an all-time high. Investment demand for these issues followed similar buying on Friday when the stock had a gain of nearly 2 points.

## No Worry Here About Poison Ivy or Oak, Says Quaintance

Early last week the Evening Observer ran an interesting article on poison ivy, timely in many parts of the United States. In eastern Oregon, however, this plant is so rare that for practical purposes it may be regarded as absent from our borders, said Dr. Charles W. Quaintance, of the college faculty.

"Poison ivy and poison oak are two different names for the same plant," he says. "In old books the two are regarded as separate because of slight differences in leaf. Both are shrub or vine bearing their leaflets in three. Both have white vines in the fall. However poison oak from the localities, such as the Willamette valley, has been grown in greenhouses in Michigan, and it is impossible to tell this greenhouse poison oak from the so-called poison ivy," he said.

Poison ivy, incidentally, is related to the beautiful sumac such as the native species on Mt. Emily, which of course is non-poisonous.

"Within the past 10 years, one of our prominent physicians has treated not more than six cases of skin poisoning possibly caused by poison ivy. I have never seen it in eastern Oregon, but if it does occur it may be in the Imnaha and Snake river canyons at the base of ledges and steep slopes," Dr. Quaintance stated, adding that in view of the extreme rarity of poison ivy in eastern Oregon, "I believe we can safely hike, fish and hunt without fear of the dangerous oil produced by the ivy plant."

"Especially to tourists we can add another remarkable feature to the great play ground of Union and Willowa counties—there will be no poison ivy to mar happy vacation days," he concluded.

## Feeding Problem In Berlin Solved

BERLIN, July 9 (UP) — A central allied military government probably will be established in Berlin this week which is expected to solve most difficulties over feeding and governing the German capital, it was learned today.

The difficulties have been acute since American and British forces took over occupation zones in Berlin due to the lack of coordination and correlation of the American, British and Russian occupying groups.

## GOP Favors Two Term Tradition

WASHINGTON, July 9 (UP) — Republicans opened a campaign today to restore the two-term presidential tradition by constitutional amendment.

House Republican leaders Joseph W. Martin, jr., said congress should submit to the states next autumn an amendment which would limit the tenure of a president to two terms of four years each.

## Legal Tax Evasion Scheme Under Fire In Washington

WASHINGTON, July 9 (UP) — An alleged "legal" Wall street scheme to deprive the U. S. treasury of \$500,000,000 in taxes each year was under investigation by congress today.

The scheme was described on the house floor Friday as the biggest rape of industry and raid on the federal treasury ever dreamed up by mind of man.

Rep. Lyle H. Boren, D., Okla., who made the charges, said a group of "shrewd manipulators" had banded together to create a "swindle, Inc."

"Wall street bankers would convert the 18 billion dollar private utility industry to a form of tax free but fake public ownership by the formation of "non-profit" corporations. These corporations then issue bonds against the revenue of the property.

"The former tax revenue would not be passed on to the public in reduced electric rates but diverted to their own pockets in the form of interest on these revenue bonds."

Boren named Guy C. Myers, Wall street financial agent, as the "most important figure in the alleged manipulations." He said, "his opposite number among the bonding gang" is Howard L. Aller, president of the American Power and Light company of New York City.

"It is believed to be in the process of negotiation in Seattle, Portland and Spokane," he said.

Boren charged it was Aller who "unloaded" the Nebraska power company's common stock on Myers' synthetic "non-profit" corporation, the Omaha Electric Committee, Inc., for \$14,400,000, stock that cost the American power \$815,000 and which had a legitimate earning value that might possibly justify a price of five million dollars.

"Another deal reported to be on fire between these two men involves the Pacific Power & Light company and the Northwestern Electric company, adjacent companies of the American power system with headquarters in Portland.

## Portland Physician Drowns in Columbia

PORTLAND, July 9 (UP) — Mayor Earl Riley disclosed plans today to strengthen Portland's importance as a principal Pacific coast port, by appointing a port development organization, consisting of an executive committee of 19 and a large working committee of 76.

A 16-point program of development with which the committee will concern itself, incorporating the multiple goals of market development, operation of complete facilities for the repair and outfitting of ships and expansion of ports in neighboring areas, was also announced by the mayor.

The extensive program, which will greatly enhance Portland's port and waterfront facilities, will also seek the development of other northwest ports including Astoria, Vancouver, Hood River, The Dalles, Walla Walla, Longview, Pendleton, Lewiston, Kelso, Oregon City, Albany, Salem, Eugene and other communities that may become a network of commerce flowing through the Columbia and tributary rivers.

## Berserk Guard Kills 8 Prisoners

SALINA, Utah, July 9 (UP) — A 23-year-old tower guard, who had never aimed a shot at the enemy during eight months overseas, is in military custody today.

He fired a .30 caliber machine gun into a tentful of sleeping German prisoners of war, killing eight and injuring 20 others.

Col. Arthur J. Ericsson, commander of the base camp at Ogden, Utah, of which the Salina camp is a branch, said Pvt. Clarence V. Bertucci, New Orleans, "for no apparent reason" sprayed a full belt of machine gun bullets on the slumbering prisoners.

Eight died almost immediately and six of the wounded were in critical condition.

"Bertucci apparently went berserk and for no apparent reason cut loose with the gun and kept shooting until he ran out of ammunition," Ericsson told reporters.

## Escape Avalanche On Mt. Hood Crest

PORTLAND, July 9 (UP) — More than a score of mountain climbers narrowly escaped death Sunday when a massive avalanche of ice, snow and rock cascaded down the crest of Mt. Hood.

All registered climbers on the mountain at the time of the slide were accounted for.

The avalanche, which was one of the largest to occur on the mountain in recent years, could be seen tumbling from near the summit on the south side of Mt. Hood.

The slide, which came without warning, crashed from the summit ridge just west of the "chute," the climber's alley from Crater rock to the top, at the head of Zigzag glacier.
