Markets

Railroad Shares Lead Recovery

NEW YORK, July 12 (UP)—Railroad shares led a broad recovery on the stock market today after a period of irregularity. Trading increased.

Rails registered gains ranging to more than a point in Santa Fe, Atlantic Coast Line, and Southern Pacific. Norfolk & Western rose 2 points from its low. Strength in steels with U. S. steels up a point and Bethlehem at a new high for the year, featured the industrials. Chrysler rose more than 2 points and Willys-Overland, gained nearly 2 points.

The improvement in the general list came when the earlier irregularity failed to generate any selling of significance. Some week-end short-covering helped swell volume.

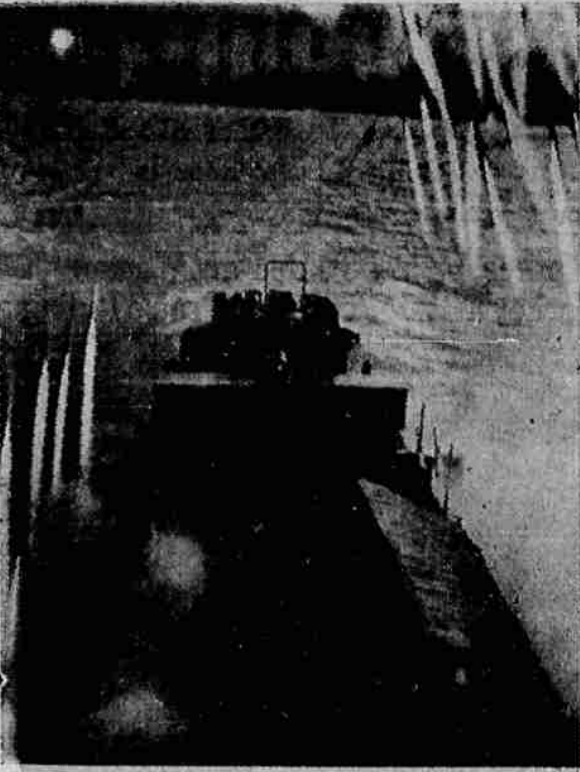

House Approves of \$250,000 For FEPC

WASHINGTON, July 12 (UP) —The house today approved a \$250,000 appropriation for the fair employment practice committee. The money could be used either to terminate its functions or to continue operations pending approval of additional funds.

Approval of the appropriation was by voice vote. A motion to specify that the money be used for liquidation only was defeated by a roll call vote of 188 to 116 after an hour of heated debate.

The house action indicated fairly prompt passage of the \$752,000,000 war agencies bill that has been tied up for several weeks as the senate and house wrangled over FEPC.

The senate voted \$250,000 to continue FEPC functions, which the house ignored until today. And the senate had refused to take any further action on the war agencies bill until the house voted by FEPC.

The house vote on FEPC followed a plea by Chairman Clarence Cannon, D., Me., of the ap-

Union Pacific War Bond Goal Exceeded

OMAHA, July 12—Employees of the Union Pacific railroad exceeded their \$4,000,000 seventh war loan quota by \$254,855, Walter Wilson, chairman of the railroad's war bond committee, has announced.

Payroll deductions accounted for \$2,517,524 of the total, Wilson said, with \$1,737,331 in cash purchases making up the remainder. These purchases represent an average investment of \$78.89 per employe during the drive, according to Mr. Wilson.

The Colorado division led all others with purchases totaling 128.6 percent of its quota, with the Washington, Utah, Kansas, Idaho, Los Angeles, Wyoming, Oregon and Nebraska divisions following in that order.

Other divisions exceeding 100 percent of quota were Washington, 107.6 percent; Utah, 107.5 percent; and Kansas, 100.2 percent.

June Record For Lumber Improved

PORTLAND, July 12 (UP)—Record of the west coast lumber industry for June was slightly better than May's both in log inventory and sawmill production.

Nonetheless, the lumber cut is 12 percent behind the same months of 1944, the West Coast Lumbermen's association announced in its monthly report for the Douglas fir belt.

Production in June was at the average rate of 135,585,000 board feet a week, compared with 130,632,000 board feet in May.

For the first 26 weeks of 1945, production amounted to 3,821,892,000 board feet, as against 4,121,468,000 board feet in the like period of 1944.

The industry's unfilled-order file stood at 950,546,000 board feet at the end of June, with gross stocks at 299,835,000. During the 26-week period the industry received orders for 3,846,638,000 board feet and shipped 3,630,829,000 board feet. Both figures exceed the total cut.

July production will be down due to paid vacations many operators are giving employes under terms of working agreements.

In addition, a large number of repair jobs which can not be delayed will result in lowered production.
