MORE SERVICE — As an additional service to returning veterans, Fletcher R. Milton, manager of the local office of the U. S. employment service, announces the appointment of Leslie C. Thompson, occupational analyst, as Oregon representative of the USES at Fort Lewis, Wash. Appointed by L. C. Stoll, state manpower director, Thompson will coordinate separation officers on the techniques of converting skills acquired by men while in military service to occupations in civilian industry, Mr. Milton said. He will be supplied current information about job opportunities and industrial trends by local USES office managers throughout the state, thereby providing veterans with specific detailed material concerning their own home localities.

Another Bill to Seek 'West Point On West Coast'

Several Proposals For Naval Schools In West, South

WASHINGTON, July 17 (UP) — A bill proposing establishment of a military academy on the Pacific coast was introduced today for Rep. Leroy Johnson, R. Calif. Johnson is the fourth congressman to suggest the need of a western West Point. His bill would authorize the secretary of war to start investigations and report to the house military affairs committee with recommended locations if he finds a need exists for a second academy.

Four Bills
"On the western side of the continent we should have a school where our future army officers and enlisted men can be trained in every type of warfare," Johnson said in a statement written before he left for California yesterday.

Although the bill stipulates "west coast," the statement urges selection of site in California because of its variety of climate and topography. Senators Theodore Bilbo, D. Miss., and Guy Cordon, R. Ore., have introduced similar bills providing for a "west coast" location. Rep. Gordon McDonough, R. Calif., specified a site in "southern California" in his bill introduced earlier this year.

No action has been taken on any of these bills nor on any of those introduced to establish naval academies in the west. One of these was introduced by Bilbo, who wants both a naval and army academy in the south. Reps. John Tolan, D., Calif., and Franck Havenner, D., Calif., urged a location in the San Francisco bay area in their bills.

Rep. Hugh Delacy, D., Wash., sponsored a bill to locate a second Annapolis at Puget Sound. McDonough also wants a western naval academy, but he wants it in southern California.

Lawrence Hawes Also Has Model Of 'Half Moon'

Walfred Gudmundson, who, in a Portland paper Sunday, showed what he believed to be the only scale model of Henry Hudson's Half Moon, is actually unable to claim even the only model in Oregon, since Lawrence Hawes, 604 Adams avenue, also has a scale model of the famous ship.

The model was built by Elmer Goddard in 1937, carved from one large piece of mahogany, instead of being made from separate pieces of sugar pine and fir as Gudmundson's model. Goddard was six months building the ship, which bears the original Dutch spelling "Haelve Maen," an has two anchors, two cannons on each side, and two aft. There is one deck gun, one life boat, and three tiny stairways, two with five steps each, and one with two steps.

The sails are kept down, but can be hoisted, when desired, by midget ropes passing through pulleys. The pulleys were made by sawing knitting needles into sections.

After Goddard's death in 1941, Mrs. Goddard presented the model to Hawes, who keeps it on top of his desk at home. Goddard made only one other ship, a model of a pirate ship, now owned by one of his friends in Portland.

26,000 Workers To Transfer To Ship Repair Jobs

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17 (UP) — The war manpower commission announced today the nation is at work on a program to transfer 26,000 skilled workers to critical jobs in ship repair yards, railroads and other high priority war plants in California, Arizona, Nevada, Oregon and Washington.

WMC Director Robert C. Goodwin, reporting the program at the close of a three-day conference of regional WMC directors from throughout the nation, said the 43 states outside the west coast area will seek to recruit 26,000 workers for transfer to the west. The five states in turn will match this number with workers channeled from ship construction yards and other less essential plants to more vital jobs.

Provision must also be made by WMC, Goodwin said, for critical war manpower needs in other war producing areas, including the Atlantic seaboard, southern states, midwest region and Rocky mountain area, where urgent schedules in munitions, textiles, lumber, mining and basic war materials call for many worker replacements.

Chinese Threaten Former Air Base

CHUNGKING, July 17 (UP) — Chinese troops penetrated Kweilin today in a quick smash that threatened to overrun the largest Japanese-held 14th U. S. air force base in China.

Two advancing columns in Kwangsi province pushed 20 miles north of Kweilin to cut off the enemy's retreat toward Hunan province.

Forward elements of Chinese troops stormed Kweilin's outer perimeter, advanced through outlying defenses and smashed into the suburbs.

Primary targets of this ground campaign are three huge air fields dotting Kweilin's outskirts, which constitute the largest base abandoned to the enemy.

A communique announced Chinese troops in Kwangtung province captured Tinpak, 150 miles west of Hongkong, and Tungshin, in the southwestern coast of the province approximately 290 miles southwest of Kweilin.

City of Los Angeles Wrecked in Iowa

CHICAGO, July 17 (UP) — The crack Union Pacific streamliner, the eastbound City of Los Angeles, was derailed early today near Dunlap, Ia., after a cloudburst loosened railroad ties, Northwestern railroad officials said.

No passengers or crew members were injured when 13 of the train's 17 cars jumped the rails, officials said.

Only the diner, unoccupied when the accident occurred at 5 a.m., turned over. The remaining cars remained upright on the roadbed, the engine and first three cars passed over the loosened rails without mishap.

Purple Heart to Son Of La Grande Woman

Posthumous award of the purple heart to her son, Pfc. Allen Hanson, 26, paratrooper, was revealed today by Mrs. Walter Enderson of 2208 Cedar street. The Endersons have lived here about a year, coming here from Wahpeton, N. D.

Private Hanson was killed April 29, 1945, in action in Germany and was buried with military honors in a cemetery in Holland. He had participated in the campaigns in Africa, Sicily, Italy, Normandy and Holland. Born in Wahpeton, he had gone to school there. He joined the army in February of 1942. Beside the purple heart he had also the bronze star.

Communists Soon To Boot Browder Out, Take Foster

WASHINGTON, July 17 (UP) — American communists are about to boot Earl Browder out of the party command in a maneuver toward resuming the class war they abandoned nearly two years ago under his leadership.

Browder persuaded the party to give up its active political status and to become the communist political association. It was his theory all elements of the population of the United States could live, work and prosper together. Other communists challenged Browder.

Likely Foster
Now after more than a month of public discussion in the communist press, these developments appear likely:

1. Removal of Browder and selection of an advocate of the class struggle as American communist leader. William Foster, a veteran of the movement, seems to be a likely successor.

2. Abandonment of the "political association" type or organization in favor of a regularly organized political party.

3. An aggressive communist boring into all mass organizations — notably labor unions.

Back Again
All the foregoing is in the discussion stage and awaits final decision by a communist convention.

But the trend of communist sympathy is clearly evident in the organization's daily and weekly press. Columns of discussion have been printed with little if any disagreement with the argument communists had better get back into the class struggle business.

The communists recognize the fact they are too few in number to be a major political factor, although they have on occasion balanced-of-power votes in New York state. Therefore they frankly assert their interest in boring into other mass organizations to spread the party line. Ultimately they hope to break through the two-party system in the United States.

Americans to Get 'Just' Share of Nation's Food Crop

WASHINGTON, July 17 (UP) — American civilians are going to get a just share of the nation's food supply — and not simply what is left in the cupboard after other demands have been met.

Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson made that clear today with his pledge the needs of the American people must and will be given "due recognition" when food is being allocated for military and foreign use.

In his first public survey of food problems, the nation's new food boss said the policy of "elose and constant" scrutiny of food demands already has brought results.

Truman Asks For 'One Man Board'

WASHINGTON, July 17 (UP) — President Truman today asked congress to scrap the three-man surplus property board and authorize appointment of a single official to direct the vast job of handling the government's surplus war property.

Experience has shown the job should be centralized under a single head, Truman said in a special message to congress.

The program now is administered by a three-man board. Its new chairman, W. Stuart Symington of St. Louis, took his oath of office only yesterday. It
