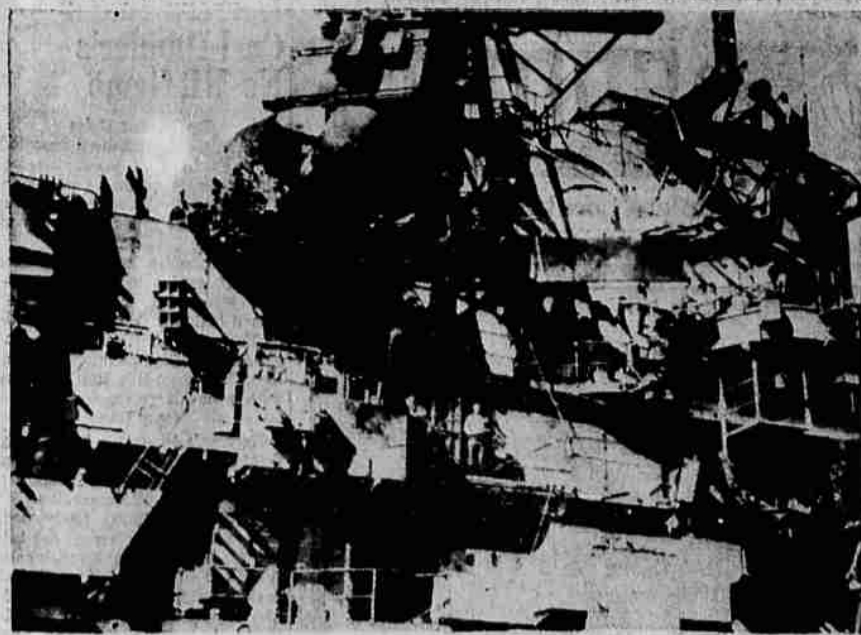

Senators Support Kaiser's Proposed Pre-paid Medicine

Would Provide Bank Loans to Organizations

SAN FRANCISCO, July 19 (UP)—Henry Kaiser, west coast industrialist, has obtained senatorial support for a bill providing for establishment of voluntary systems of prepaid medical care throughout the country, the San Francisco Chronicle said today.

An amendment to the national housing act whereby the federal housing agency would administer financing of individual projects will be introduced by Sen. Claude Pepper, D., Fla., the paper said.

Kaiser said he had conferred with Senators Pepper, Lister Hill, D., Ala., James Murray, D., Mont., and Robert Taft, R., Ohio. He said "their questions indicated they had no serious objections to the plan."

The measure provides FHA guaranteed bank loans to groups, such as physicians, labor, management, labor-management and states, who wish to set up facilities for prepaid medical care; technical assistance by the U. S. public health service in determining the need and likelihood of success for the individual project; limitations barring the FHA administration from exercising supervision or control over the project; preference from using existing public or private facilities.

Kaiser said the prepaid medical plans will operate as business enterprises, motivated by the impelling force of competition.

"This is not socialized medicine in the sense of a social experiment," he added.

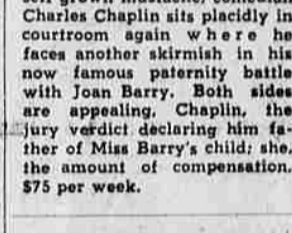

Fighter Bombers Attack Kyushu

MANILA, July 19 (UP)—Fighter bombers of the fifth and seventh air forces carried out low-level bombing and strafing attacks against railroads, communications lines and waterfront areas in southern Kyushu island, Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today.

The raiders also hit shipping in waters off Kyushu and raided railroad tunnels northwest and southwest of Kagoshima, a communique reported.

NEW YORK, July 19 (UP) — The stock market today extended the closing rally of the previous session but trading contracted sharply on the movement.

Bullishness largely reflected issuance of good corporation earnings reports, including higher figures for Du Pont, as well as a bulge in carloadings for the week ended July 14. Another factor in the better feeling was the action of Agriculture Secretary Anderson in extending the present liquor "holiday" for production of beverage alcohol into August.
