Reed College Has New President

PORTLAND, July 23 (UP)—Presidency of Reed college, vacant since the resignation of Dr. Dexter M. Keezer in 1942, was filled today by Dr. Peter H. Odgaard, 44, prominent educator and recent U. S. treasury executive.

Dr. Arthur Scott, professor of chemistry, has been acting president since Dr. Keezer's resignation. Simeon P. Winch, chairman of the college board of trustees, announced the appointment of Odgaard to the college presidency Sunday.

Senators Charge U. S. Bounds By Secret Agreements

Cites Reparations Deal Made At Yalta Talks

WASHINGTON, July 23 (UP)—Some senators charged today the American people "apparently are bound by agreements made without their knowledge" following reports of a secret pact at the Yalta conference to exact \$20,000,000,000 in reparations from Germany, with Russia receiving half the total.

Sen. Harlin J. Bushfield, R., S. D. said he wondered "when we're going to get through with secret agreements"

The purported secret agreement was reported yesterday by Bert Andrews, chief of the New York Herald Tribune's Washington bureau. He said it was determined at the Yalta conference "in great detail" exactly how much reparations would be paid by Germany and what part of it would go to each of the big three nations.

The late President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Premier Joseph Stalin "agreed to exact 20 billion dollars in reparations from Germany in five years," Andrews said.

"The agreement was a Russia would get 50 percent, the United States 20 percent, Great Britain 20 percent and the minor victims of Nazi aggression in Europe, 10 percent.
