## Predictions For Farming Trends 'Impossible'

UNION, July 25 (Special) No predictions can be made as to future trends in Union county farming, according to R. W. Schaad, county agent, who addressed the Pomona Grange picnic.

Schaad has observed changes from one type of crop to another in the county several times. Up to 20 years ago the bulk of farming in the Grande Rnd valley was in wheat. Then it changed to diversified farming with field seeds taking the lead.

This trend led to the formation of the Blue Mountain seed growers association about eight years ago.

Then, with the war, the trend was again to wheat.

More than 130 persons attended the picnic, which started with a field demonstration in the morning, followed by dinner. The program was under the direction of Mrs. Edd Buswell of Cove, lecturer of the Pomona Grange. Mrs. Frank Jasper led community singing, and Mr. Avery, experiment station director, gave the address of welcome to which Emil Miller of Elgin, Grange master, responded. Frank Wright, past master of Pomona Grange, gave two readings. There were games and contests. Mrs. Margaret Thorpe of Union won the husband calling contest.

## Crosby to Direct Kenny Campaign

MINNEAPOLIS, July 25 (UP)—Screen star Bing Crosby will direct a campaign to raise \$5,000,000 to carry the sister Kenny infantile paralysis treatment to every state in the union. Crosby telegraphed the Elizabeth Kenny institute yesterday, indicating his acceptance of the chairmanship of the 1945 campaign.

Money raised during the campaign will be divided on a 50-50 basis. Half will be retained by each state to establish clinics for training students in the Kenny technique or to support hospitals for polo victims. The remainder will go to the permanent headquarters of the Kenny institute.

## TODAY'S SPORT PARADE

NEW YORK, July 25 (UP)—Gotham's baseball crowd was a house divided today over whether loquacious Larry MacPhail, president of the Yankees, went "out of bounds" to criticize Manager Joe McCarthy's club for lack of hustle.

Baseball scribes, subway riders, the fan in the street and even the players themselves pitched into the controversy which may or may not have anything to do with McCarthy's unaccepted resignation and his nervous illness that sent him home to Buffalo, N. Y., for a rest.

**Amateurs**  
MacPhail, who steadfastly has kept his word that he would not enter the Yankee dressing room or interfere with McCarthy's management of the club, watched the team grow progressively. He saw an infield that frequently looked amateurish pile up a total that now has reached 112 errors for 82 games, highest for either league.

He saw players drawing salaries for mediocre play that would be fabulously high for stars on any other club in baseball. Finally he blew his top. In typical picturesqueness of language he decried the "disinterested attitude" of many of the players and their "lack of hustle and emotion."

**Resigned**  
Significantly or not McCarthy's illness stemmed from the date of MacPhail's blast to newspapers. That he resigned flatly there is no doubt—that MacPhail desperately tried to persuade him to reconsider also is established definitely.

What is doubtful is whether there was a connection between MacPhail's blast and McCarthy's absenteeism. And that is what has the fans, the scribes and the players in a dither.

One school of thought insists that McCarthy, with a proud record of no second division teams in 14 years as Yankee manager, simply couldn't take it any longer as he watched the most inept club he ever directed pass up opportunity after opportunity to move up as contenders.

**Lost Seven**  
During the home stay which produced the crisis, the Yankees have won only three games and have lost seven. They have been playing below the 400 mark for more than a month. This school believes MacPhail's criticism, though valid, wall ill-timed and that he might better have been able to serve the club by a few player deals.

The other side contends that as long as MacPhail is boss man and holds the purse strings, he has a perfect right to be critical and they emphasize he did not in any way criticize McCarthy or his methods.

## Babe Freese Hailed As Best Woman In Golf In Years

CHICAGO, July 25 (UP)—Carol (Babe) Freese, a little, pug-nosed kid from Portland, Ore., today was hailed as the coming women golf champion of America—the kind of player who some day may dominate the distaff side of the game as Byron Nelson now rules the male competition.

Miss Freese is just 5 feet, 2 inches tall and weighs a little over 100 pounds, but she has a big heart and whopping power in her drives as she proved yesterday by taking medalist honors in qualifying for the all-American woman's open.

The Tam O'Shanter course, with its rolling greens and long holes, is tough for women, but she came within one stroke of tying the women's course record with a three-under-par 73 to lead the 24 qualifiers.

Although this is only her third major tournament, Lt. Ben Hogan and Nelson hailed Miss Freese as "the greatest woman player to come along since Babe Didrikson," currently the queen of feminine golf.

"Give her a little more experience—she's only 20—and she'll be the greatest of them all by far," said Fred Corcoran, P. G. A. tournament manager.

## American Loop Looks Like Race Backwards

NEW YORK, July 25 (UP)—You'd think it was the last place Athletics the so-called American league contenders were trying to catch these days in a race that seems to be developing into a full "retreat" from the pennant.

Take the pace setting Detroit Tigers. They left home on an eastern road trip, four and a half games in front and won only four games, losing seven and tying one. That they still are three full games in front is evidence of the backward trend.

**Loes Fourth**  
The second place Washington Senators came home after one of the most successful road trips in years and promptly hit a mediocre stride, winning six and losing seven. They climaxed their stand last night by dropping their third straight game to the Cleveland Indians, 4 to 0. Fire-baller Allie Reynolds pitched a seven-hitter for Cleveland. Lambert (Dutch) Meyer paced the 11-hit Indian attack off Emil (Dutch) Leonard, who suffered his fourth defeat. It was Reynold's 10th win.

The St. Louis Browns, who picked up some ground on their eastern swing, fell out of the first division after squeezing in for a day, losing a 6 to 0 shutout at Boston. Emmett O'Neill pitched a four-hitter. Sigmund Jakucki, usually a control artist, lost mainly because of his wildness.

**Cubs Lead**  
The Cubs, with southpaw Bob Chipman back in marness, beat the Phillies at Chicago, 8 to 3, for their 24th victory in 31 games against eastern teams since June 27. Bill Nicholson's three run triple was the key blow for Chipman in his first appearance since June 20. The win kept Chicago's four and a half game lead in the National intact.

The Giants remained ahead of the Reds in fifth place in the National league, winning, 6 to 4, at Cincinnati. Harry Feldman served up a home run pitch to Frank McCormick which accounted for two Red runs, but after that happened in the second, he had little trouble. He also made two hits.

**Cards Win**  
The Pirates won their fifth game in six from the Braves, 6 to 5, in 11 innings. Veteran Jackie Saltzgeber scored the tying run in the ninth inning, after singling. In the 11th he came across with the winning run on a long fly after leading off with a triple. Relief pitcher Ken Gables won his seventh game without a defeat.

Augie Bergamo of the Cards broke a second place tie with the Brooklyn Dodgers by singling in the ninth to score Marty Marion for a 7 to 6 victory. It was his

third straight hit and enabled the Birds to climax an uphill battle which found them behind 6 to 1 at one time.

No other games were scheduled.

Cut to Six Games San Diego Goes Into Sixth

The Seattle Rainiers found Lefty Roy Helser's slants to their liking Tuesday night for five innings and coupled with George McDonald's double went on to defeat the league leading Portland Beavers, 6-1, and shave a complete game off the Beavos' lead, now six games.

Jake Moty came in for the Beavers and stopped the Rainiers for the rest of the game.

Fischer lost his shutout with two out in the ninth inning as Johnny O'Neill crossed the plate on Larry Barton's scratch single to the infield.
