### Churchill Failure Brings Break In Stock Market

NEW YORK, July 26 (UP)—Stocks broke sharply today following news of the overwhelming defeat of the Churchill government.

Trading picked up on the decline which reduced values by fractions to more than 3 points in most issues traded. The decline got under way slowly and accelerated as the session progressed. Leaders were making new lows for the day at closing time.

Wall Street did not believe the labor victory in Britain would affect British foreign policy but it feared a sharp trend to the left there with government entry into business. Accompanying the British election news were further reports in the street that the Japanese war was in its last quarter and this helped the selling along.

## Churchill Cabinet Badly Beaten As Laborites Win

they had not seen Churchill all day and that there was no chance that he would make a personal appearance. But the crowd did not budge.

The defeat suffered by Churchill and his caretaker government was one of the worst in British history. Eleven of the 15 members of the cabinet were voted out of office. Production Minister Oliver Lyttelton survived.

The fate of Col. J. J. Llewellyn, minister of food, and of Sir John Anderson, chancellor of the exchequer, still is uncertain.

City Stunned  
The electoral results stunned the City—London's equivalent of Wall Street. Trading on the stock exchange was at a standstill.

The labor party victory but were not prepared for a sweep by the labor party whose program is frankly socialistic and which demands the nationalization of some of Britain's key industries.

The labor sweep carried not only its strongholds in the Welsh mining country and the industrial cities of the Midlands but also the great residential suburbs of London and the rural areas which have been conservative for generations. The conservative victories, generally, occurred in districts where the opposition was split.

Late Selling Hits Rye Pit; Other Grains Easier  
CHICAGO, July 26 (UP)—Announced ceilings on the 1946 rye crop and board of trade action placing a \$1.44 1/2 maximum for July 1946 rye futures led to late selling in this pit today.

Other grains eased with corn independently steady. Rye finished the day off 3/4 to 1 1/4 cents a bushel; wheat off 3/4 to 7/8; corn unchanged, oats off 3/4 to 1 1/2, and barley off 3/4.

Although grainmen paid close attention to the English election it failed to have much effect as a price-making influence. Prices in all pits, particularly rye, moved nervously most of the session. Rye advanced sharply after an early break but lost ground before the close.

Wheat trade was active with cash interests on both sides of the market. Mills bought liberally of futures reflecting the improved flour demand. Flour business has increased in anticipation of a reduction in the August government mill subsidy.

Weather conditions for harvesting the winter wheat crop continued excellent and the movement of grain was hampered only by lack of box cars.

Funeral Services Held For 2 Fliers  
ONTARIO, July 26 (UP)—Double funeral services were held yesterday for Frank N. Van Petten and Charles P. Flegel, air crash victims near Yellow Pine, Ida., on May 27.

The bodies were not found until last Saturday in the isolated and rugged Idaho mountain country. The business men received full military and Masonic honors and were buried in the Ontario cemetery.

Van Petten was a major in the civil air patrol and Flegel a veteran of World War I. Flegel was a brother of Austin Flegel, jr., of Portland, president of the Willamette Iron and Steel company.

231 RELEASED  
SALEM, July 26 (UP)—Col. Elmer V. Wooten, state director of selective service, today reported that 231 Oregon men were released from the army under the point system last week. Of these, 54 have been in service since September, 1940, when the national guard was mobilized, he said.

car, bringing with them also Stareo's body.

Eberhard said several times there have been complaints to him and to the sheriff from both Stareo and Ogilvie this spring, but there had been no warrants issued for either party to the dispute, there having been no criminal act against which action might be taken, previously, he said.

Ogilvie has lived in the Cove neighborhood for many years. His son, Theodore, lives in La Grande neighborhood.

Stareo had leased the Stakland ranch for the last six years but before that had lived in the Sparta community for more than 30 years.

Funeral Saturday  
Stareo was born at Houston, Tex., June 1, 1888. He was a veteran of the first world war and attended the Baptist church at Cove. Besides his wife, Jessie, he leaves a daughter, Jacklyn, 14; two sisters, Mrs. Noyes and Mrs. Cora Calkins, who lives in Missouri, and a brother, Jesse Pduckett of Hilgard.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the Cove Baptist church, with Rev. Charles Hancock officiating. Burial will be in Cove cemetery.
